EDGEMO, Ore., Feb. 7 (AP) — University of Washington edged a step closer to the coast conference north division basketball throne by defeating University of Oregon 36 to 30 here last night.

The Huskies will play their four remaining league games at home, but against their bitterest rivals, Friday and Saturday of next week Oregon State, only team to win from Washington this year, will be met at Seattle. The following week it will be Washington State.

Washington has won 10 and lost two while Oregon State has won six and lost four. The other teams are just not mentioned in top-notch championship talk.

The Huskies led all the way last night and had enough zipper left to halt Oregon's last straw rally late in the game. Glen Sanford, substitute sophomore guard, scored three goals in succession to lead the Webfoots in a 10-point rally.

Washington led 16 to 12 at half-time. The long shots of Lee featured the game, accounting for 14 points. That was his answer to the close checking Oregon imposed on Glen Sanford and W. Jones shared Oregon's scoring honors, with six points each.

The victory cemented the Webfoots in the cellar, but with half their games still ahead they may be able to pull out.

Cavelli Wins Nod Over Frank Monroe

Exports of Wheat From Oregon Gain

PORTLAND, Feb. 7 (AP) — A total of 2,136,374 bushels of wheat left the Columbia river during January, the merchants' exchange announced, compared with only 563,052 bushels exported in January, 1933. Europe took about 100,000 bushels more of this grain than did China. Flour shipments last month amounted to 257,120 barrels, whereas 162,767 barrels were moved out in January, 1933.
