

WORKING HOURS FOR WOMEN ARE CUT TO 48 HOURS

SALEM, Ore. (AP)—The recent order of the state welfare commission limiting working hours for women employees in mercantile establishments is little different than the orders adopted in 1919 by the industrial welfare commission and which were in operation until recently.

Charles H. Gram, state labor commissioner, said today.

The order was adopted by the commission and will become effective April 4. Gram announced here. It is state-wide and applies to other parts of the state as well as in Portland.

The new order prohibits employment of women after six o'clock in the evening, on Sundays, and more than 9 hours in any one day and 48 hours in any week. It sets the minimum wage at 30 cents per hour as

against the old rule of \$13.50 a week.

The old orders prohibited employment of women after 6 o'clock in Portland and 8:30 in other parts of the state in mercantile establishments. The new order makes it 6 p. m. for over the entire state.

The new order also defines an apprentice to be a person with less than six months' experience in the mercantile trade and also defines junior employees as under 18 years of age. The minimum wage for apprentices and junior employees is 27½ cents an hour. In all other respects the new rules conform to the old ones which have been in effect for many years, until a court injunction held the welfare commission did not have the power to establish working hours for women. This was corrected by the 1933 legislative act giving the commission this power.

Ragout of Lamb with Peas: Cut one pound of stewing lamb in pieces for serving, dredge with flour and brown with two sliced onions in drippings. Add three cups of cold water and two teaspoons of salt, and simmer for two hours, covered. Add the contents of an eight-ounce can of peas, two potatoes cut in small cubes or balls and half a cup of canned tomatoes. Cook, uncovered, until the potatoes are tender. Thicken the liquid very slightly with flour. Season, if necessary.

Cocunut Cream: Soften one tablespoon of gelatin in four table-spoons of cold water. Scald two cups milk and one-third cup of sugar, and dissolve gelatin in it. Cool. Add a few drops of vanilla, turn into four wet molds and chill. Turn out, top with four table-spoons of raspberry or strawberry preserves, and sprinkle with a third of a can of moist coconut. Serve with two-thirds of a cup of light cream or top milk.

U. S. FARMERS TO GET BILLION IN CASH THIS YEAR

WASHINGTON (AP)—The handling of about a billion dollars to American farmers during 1934 as benefit payments for production control and corn loans is planned by the farm administration.

Official estimates covering the wheat, corn and hops, cotton, tobacco, and corn loans programs were disclosed to call for an estimated expenditure of \$766,512,695 or more than five times the \$152,521,177 spent in 1933.

In addition an emergency fund of \$200,000,000 would be provided for benefit payments to beef and dairy cattle farmers in a bill passed by the house and favorably reported by a senate committee.

More payments to wheat farmers under a now-contemplated second acreage reduction would bring the total well above \$1,000,000,000.

Officials revealed that only \$200,000,000 of this would be paid out of the treasury. If their plans carry through, the balance being due to come from processing tax receipts.

Secretary Wallace even plans on repaying this sum out of the proposed processing tax on butterfat.

It was disclosed that farm adjustment officials have sent to the White House a projected amendment to the

farm act. If approved by the president and adopted it would hand to the adjustment administration a weapon for rigid compulsion through allowing the licensing of producers.

Officials asserted it was drafted with the idea of applying it only to regional crops, and that there would be no attempt to put in into effect with such major crops as wheat or cotton. They conceded, however, that if adopted it could be used if non-cooperators threatened one of the major voluntary control programs.

Spilling up the contemplated benefit payments for 1934 by areas, the figures showed that the midwest would receive a total of \$488,457,356, southern states \$270,260,926, western states \$35,826,362 and eastern states, \$11,844,671, while \$102,980 has not been allocated to any particular section.

Oregon would receive \$3,348,783, of which \$2,505,783 would be for distribution for wheat control, and \$843,000 for hog and corn control.
