JAPANESE HOLD TO FABULOUS VIEWS OF U. S.

TOKYO (AP) — America is a land of great wealth, vast economic experiments and enterprises, huge naval programs, far-flung imperialist ambitions, glittering movie stars. This is the picture, carried across the Pacific by radio and cable, that is firmly imprinted in the minds of scores of millions of common Japanese men and women by their newspapers.

Dominating this version of the American scene is the figure of President Roosevelt, to the newspaper-reading millions of Nippon the personification of the new kaleidoscopic America.

Mr. Ru Tops Headlines He makes the headlines, queer, vertical lines of black ideographs, probably more often than all the rest of his compatriots together. These headlines sometimes call him Daikoku Dai-ryo, President of America, but more often they shorten it to Ru-shi, Mr. Ru. This is achieved by using only the first of the five characters of the clumsy Japanese syllabary required to spell out his name—Ru-shi-bei-ru-to.

After the Japanese reader has studied the United States as a vast economic laboratory from which he hopes much benefit will reach him ultimately, he takes a turn at dredging it as the potential naval enemy of Japan. No other topic gets bigger ideographs than the dispatch from Washington about the latest pronouncement of Secretary Claude Swanson or Admiral William H. Standley. The Japanese people are told that America has started a new naval race and Japan must build more ships in self defense.

The principal cities of the United States are New York, Washington and Hollywood. To judge from the frequency of the datelines in Taru Sun-iki's favorite daily, Taru, an ardent movie fan, prefers the American folkies. But this is only amusement, and serious-minded Taru considers it unimportant. What counts is that phantasmagoria of gold greenbacks, cotton, wheat, tariffs, stock exchanges, heavy political councils, new warships, across which strides the Roosevelt colossus. Of the smaller figures, those most likely to gain his recognition are Mary Pickford, Henry Ford, Hugh S. Johnson, Bill Tilden, Babe Ruth.

Domestic Sports Dominate These days the sporting glants of the United States are foreshortened in the Japanese impression of America. As athletics have developed in this country the Japanese have ceased to look across the Pacific for idols. This has been particularly true in the last five years, so that the newer headlines of the American sporting page are comparatively unknown, while Dempsey, Ruth and Tilden are still household words.

Where Did Those New York Wolves Come From? Science Is Balked
