

WHEAT TRADERS PLAN ONSLAUGHT ON WORLD PLAN

LONDON (AP) — An organized onslaught by world wheat traders against further measures to restrict their activity was awaited as the unanimous report of the international wheat commission reached the hands of 21 governments.

Despite the confidential nature of the report, it was known that the minimum price scheme is the most important item. This was expected to galvanize hostility of the traders. A final drafting of the program was completed this week and the governments, only 15 of which were represented on the commission, are expected to act by the time the commission reassembles in Rome March 5.

"There are many in the wheat trade ready and anxious to cry 'failure,'" said the spokesman of the Big Four (Canada, Australia, United States and Argentina), "but it is the commission's task to think for the farmer. There are thousands of them to every individual wheat trader."

Traders' turnover must be restricted but in the end they will profit. "There are definite signs of a pick-up within the next few months, as already evidenced by exports being cut down to meet demand and that the export quotas established by the wheat pact are more than sufficient."

BERLIN (AP) — Hein Schroeder, Eugenic authority, wants Germany's sterilization program extended to include negro children in the Rhineland and Ruhr districts. Writing in the newspaper Deutsche Zeitung, he estimated that the country has at least 600 children of negro fathers — French colonial soldiers stationed in the two districts during the war.

Their mothers, he added, still live in the districts invaded. Sterilization is needed for the protection of the children themselves, Schroeder contended. He pointed out they were German citizens and could marry later, procreating more racial mixtures. "Their children would be regarded as non-aryans," he said, "and we have enough non-aryans in Germany already."

Only the immediate sterilization of all colored and all hybrid races in Germany can sidetrack the danger. Deep sea fishing is increasing. In popularity among winter tourists visiting Miami, Fla., and many hotels are arranging daily trips to the fishing banks.

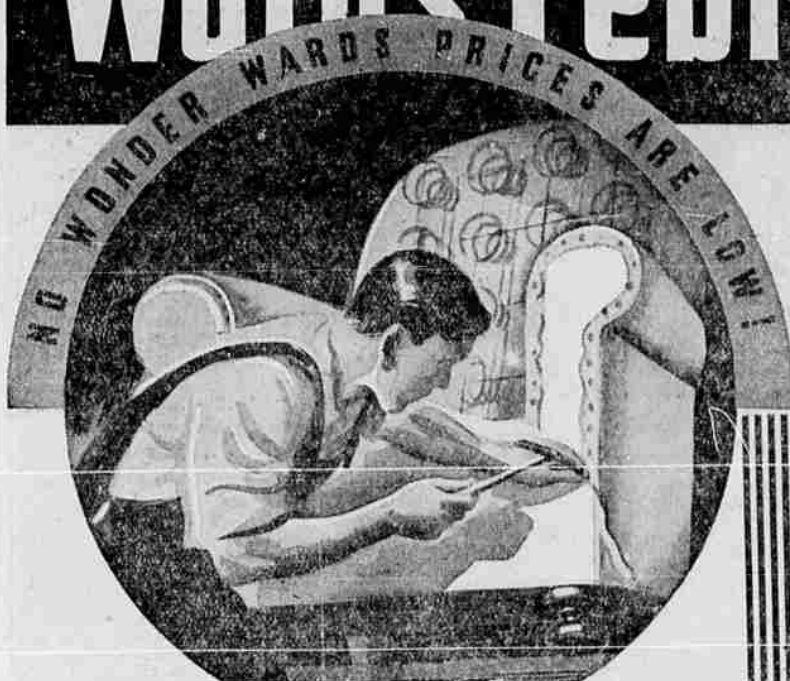
The Drew log rule, adopted by the Washington legislature in 1898, is still the legal rule of the state but is seldom used.

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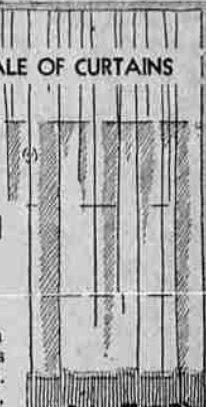
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
