

OREGON DEFEATS IDAHO VANDALS FRIDAY, 43 TO 29

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 10 (AP) — The University of Oregon basketball team jumped from the cellar into a tie for third place by defeating University of Idaho 43 to 29 here last night.

It marked the beginning of Oregon's second-half schedule and also one more victory than gained all last season.

More spirited play was shown by the Webfoots than in any previous home game this season. Pass interceptions and feeder work of Olinger, Webfoot guard, was largely responsible for the win. He made seven assists in addition to scoring four goals.

Idaho was off its shooting form, else its ball monopolizing on rebounds under the baskets might have made a much closer game.

Scoring honors were shared by W. Jones of Oregon and Naulund of Idaho. The two teams play here tonight and then Idaho moves to Corvallis to play the second-place Oregon State Beavers Monday and Tuesday nights.

Monmouth Winner Over Pacific U.

Sport Slants

It requires no crystal-gazing, of course, to note that Dartmouth football will follow the intricate outlines of the Warner System this fall under the new coaching regime headed by Earl (Red) Blak, erstwhile Army strategist, assisted by the popular "Pat" Ellinger and Andy Gustafson.

Quastman played under Warner at Pittsburgh before "Pop" went out to Stanford. Blak and Ellinger joined Major Ralph I. Basse when the Army staff took a personal course of instruction from Warner prior to installing the wingback vogue at West Point. Two straight shellackings absorbed at the hands of Stanford teams satisfied the soldier strategists that it was the type of offense they wanted.

They have done pretty well with it ever since at West Point, with Blak schooling the backs and wickers while Ellinger devoted his talents to fast, low-charging lines.

No doubt Dartmouth men, who have yet to see their team beat Yale, made due note of the neatness and dispatch with which Army teams bearing the Blak-Ellinger coaching stamp disposed of the Elis in the past two seasons.

Together Again

The addition of Marchmont Schwartz to the University of Chicago football coaching staff under Clark Shaughnessy makes the curriculum crossing again of two trails that diverged in the Old South.

Down around his home in Bay St. Louis, Miss. Schwartz acquired a schoolboy reputation on the gridiron. In the natural course of events he was attracted to Loyola University, at New Orleans, where Shaughnessy was the head coach. Marchmont had not been doing his stuff for long with the Irishman before one of the alert scouting outposts of Notre Dame had him under observation.

Soon it developed that Schwartz was anxious to prepare himself for a law career. Where better to pursue the intricacies of Blackstone, while also practicing the elusive art of the pigskin, than at Notre Dame? So Marchmont packed his grip, took a train for South Bend, and became the clutch runner of Knute Rockne's last team and made the All-America lineup of 1930-31.

Now, with his law degree and a thorough football education, Schwartz can pay the interest on an obligation to his old coach, who did not stand in the way of the small town star who wanted to make good in the big leagues of football.

Shake-Up For Cornell?

The economic experiment of giving the games back to the boys has been followed at Cornell University by undergraduate agitation for a wholesale shakeup in the athletic system. While Yale's alumni have been the most vociferous element in the demand for a new deal in athletics at New Haven, the Cornell Daily Sun, student newspaper, has taken the initiative in a campaign to oust the present regime in favor of a new director of athletics who will revise and revise Cornell's sports operations.

Championship trophies cluttered up Cornell's premises until about ten years ago. Big Red teams have declined since then, for the most part, except for the rowing revival that led to a Poughkeepsie victory in 1930, after a long lapse. Cornell hasn't had a really formidable eleven since George Pfann's unbeaten 1923 team, a winning cross-country squad since 1921, an out-door track championship since 1919 or a basketball title-holder since 1924.

Colgate's Cagers Mystify Experts; Win First Seven

HAMILTON, N. Y. (AP) — Up in the cold Chenango valley, where athletic theme songs are usually built around the prowess of the football-playing Red Raiders, attention of sports followers has now shifted to a Colgate basketball team that refuses to be beaten.

Like the "undefeated, untied and unscored on" football eleven of 1932, the basketball five started the season with very ordinary prospects. Nobody expected a good team. A year ago, with two stars playing, only five games were won while 10 were lost. Student interest sagged.

The young coach, Bob Hubbard, who finished at Colgate in 1925, was starting his second year as director of Maroon basketball destinies. His record the year before was so unimpressive it was a general conclusion that the team wasn't going any place.

But Stock Booms Now

Now, having won seven straight games, including a victory over a Syracuse five that won 19 games in succession, the general opinion has been reversed. The new deal has made basketball stock boom.

The present team is really "five fast forwards" rather than a center, two guards and two forwards. Not a man is more than six feet tall. Stacy (Bud) Campbell, the center, is an even six feet. So is Howard (Red) Laflamme, the 194-pound forward.

Capt. John (Gunner) Brooks, guard; John McCormick, forward, and John Francis (Lefty) Cahill are just under the six-foot mark.

Laflamme and Brooks were on the quietest last year. The others were reserves. McCormick, son of a local janitor, rose to the first team unexpectedly. Campbell, former Maroon school star, regained his form after playing poorly a year ago. Cahill, quiet and reserved, suddenly commenced to play fine basketball.

Refuse To Be Beaten

Thus it has happened that even when opposing teams have led until the last minutes of a game one or another of the "five forwards" has come through with baskets to win. It happened against Cornell, against St. Lawrence, against Baltimore. Unawed by the great Syracuse five, Colgate refused to be beaten—and won.

Capt. Brooks plays like an All-America quarterback — just that. He works in the back court, passing, giving signals, directing play. He calms 'em down or pep's 'em up. And away they go.
