ing in that area had ceased and that Starnberg would return to the capital today.

Chancellor Dollfus issued a "mercy offer" to socialists if they would surrender their arms. Many accepted it. Reports in New York that a 17-year-old girl, an American citizen had been killed in Vienna battles could not be verified.

The newspapers Giornale D'Italia in Rome and the Magyarars in Budapest charged the government of Czechoslovakia had supported the socialists in the rebellion against the Austrian government.

Italy had 75,000 troops concentrated on the border of her little neighbor, prepared for possible action. The government said they were not there because of the Austrian situation.

Sir John Simon, British foreign secretary, indicated to the house of commons that his government would not interfere in the present situation.

Court Challenge Ended Today By Plaintiff's Death

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—A court challenge to the right of President Roosevelt to remove a member of the federal trade commission was ended today by the sudden death of William E. Humphrey.

The former trade commissioner, 71 years old, died as the result of a stroke at his home here. He had been in frail health for some time. Humphrey had pending in federal court here a suit contesting his removal from the commission, charging that the president had acted contrary to law in taking away his post without charges of wrong doing or malfeasance.

Mr. Roosevelt in asking that he resign last summer, stated in letters brought out in court that he desired to name in Humphrey's place a man whose ideas were more closely in line with his own. Humphrey declined three such requests, and finally was removed without a resignation. He went to court for salary he maintained was due him.

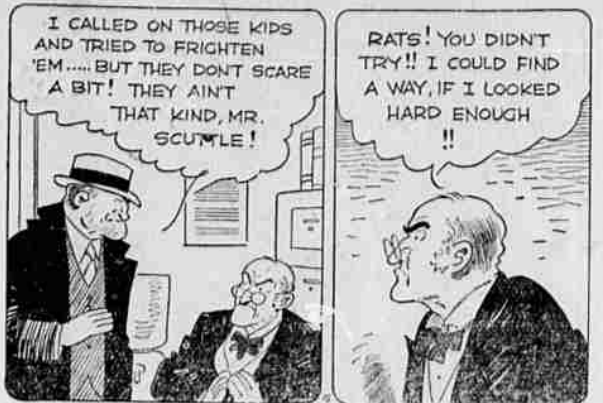
gon and the necessity for control, the dairy industry having been preyed upon by those who dairy only at the peak of prosperity and leave the permanent dairymen to weather the depression. Twenty-five million dollars are invested in dairy land and buildings in Oregon and everyday 800,000 worth of milk is produced, he said.

The purpose of the milk control board is to stabilize the price as the producer will receive a profit from labor and still sell to the consumer at a price within reason.

The majority of the doorstep deliveries have been nine cents a quart, although some have been selling for eight cents, with the cream content varying, it was said. After the uniform price is set it will be necessary to have the same cream content in each bottle of milk and of cream to avoid infraction of the law.

Some producers believed that a rise

in price to a uniform level would cut down the consumption of milk, however, the board said that in other cities where a uniform price has been reached consumption has not decreased.

Also, under the new law, as long

as there are enough dairymen in La Grande to supply the existing demand, no others may encroach on the territory.

Both Mr. Harlan and Mr. Mickie encouraged forming a milk producers and distributors association in La Grande.

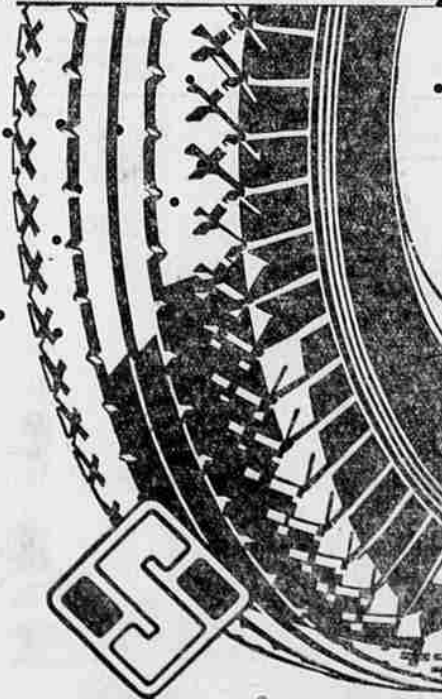
