LA GRANDE DROPS GAME TO POWDER MONDAY 25 TO 23

With the reserves playing until the last five minutes, La Grande lost to North Powder at North Powder last night in a close basketball game, 23 to 25.

Coach Ira Woodie, anxious to see his reserves under fire and pick his seventh and eighth men for the tournament play, started Hyde and Stoddard, forwards; Bean, center; Osborn and Irwin, guards, and later substituted Peterson, guard. The reserves held a 18 to 11 lead over Powder at halftime, but weakened in the third period. In the fourth period, with five minutes to go, North Powder held a 20 to 17 lead.

Coach Woodie, well satisfied with the work of the reserves, showed in his first team when scored six points to Powder's five in the last five minutes—not quite enough to win.

In a preliminary, the La Grande sophomore second team defeated the North Powder seconds 24 to 3.

Also, it was announced today that arrangements have been made for Milton-Freswater to play the Tigers in La Grande on Friday, March 2, filling in the two-week period between the sub-district tourney this weekend and the championship tourney Mar. 8, 9 and 10. Mar-11 will bring both first and second teams to La Grande.

In the scoring last night, Hyde, Osborn and Irwin, of the starting lineup, each scored four points. Bean counted three, Stoddard and Peterson failed to score.

When Zikorski, Alt, Reynolds, Webb and DeBoe went into the game, Tom, Kenneth and Ralph each scored two points.
