Cherry Orchards, Frozen Out, Are Being Replaced.—COVE (Special).—The appearance of Cove is daily changing, and it is rapidly losing its look of a wooded landscape and taking on the look of a plain. The reason is that the fruit trees are fast disappearing, being pulled from their moorings by a tractor and man power. The tractor was busy all last week in the Hefty orchard where they were pulling 1000 trees, trees that were planted more than 40 nearly 50 years ago, and were grown into, not mighty oaks, but mighty cherry trees. They were not only beautiful to look upon but were of great value and profit to the owner, returning three, four and even five thousand dollars in a single season. Small wonder that it is so appalled at the destruction.

Many other orchards are in the same condition, though there are some orchards in a more sheltered location that were not so badly killed. Cove is no longer the biggest cherry orchard in the world, though it may again become a big factor in cherry production.
