PACIFIC WOOL GROWERS GIVEN F. C. A. APPROVAL

The Pacific Wool Growers association has been approved as a marketing agency for growers whose wools are financed by the regional agricultural credit corporation or the federal intermediate credit bank units of the farm credit administration, according to work just received by Lloyd Pierce, La Grande, member of the Pacific Wool Growers, 13-year-old wool co-operative handling the clips of approximately 2,300 western growers. It maintains warehouse facilities in Portland, San Francisco and Boston, and sales offices in Boston as well as on the Pacific coast, selling its members' wools direct to mills.

A similar program was in effect last year, and the Pacific was one of the agencies marketing these government financed wools in 1933. "A most successful year has just been completed," says R. A. Ward, manager of the Pacific Wool Growers, "and we returned to our members prices several cents a pound higher than wool prices during the shearing season. Recognition by the federal administration of the orderly marketing program is gratifying to our members and directors, who have been following a similar program in the selling of their wools for 13 years."
