### AMERICAN TENNIS TEAM TAKE FIVE FROM FRENCHMEN

NEW YORK, Feb. 22 (AP)— Besides slicing themselves a substantial cash dividend for their industrious efforts, the American professional tennis combination of 22-year-old Ellsworth Vines Jr., and 41-year-old William T. Tilden 2nd, enjoyed the prestige today of a clean sweep over French rivals in the first international pro team match ever played in this country.

After capturing the first three matches Monday night while the big blizzard was blowing up outside Madison Square Garden, the Americans made it five in a row last night as Vines blasted Martin Piau, the curly haired Basque, 13-11, 6-3, 6-3, and Tilden, then rallied to conquer his old Davis cup nemesis, Henri Cochet, in a dramatic five set struggle, 7-9, 6-1, 4-6, 6-3, 6-3.

### Poultry Men In Move For Fair Returns

An informal meeting of several extensive poultry owners was held in La Grande Monday night. At this meeting conditions surrounding the poultry industry were discussed and plans outlined to organize with a view to improving these conditions. A committee to get in touch with the range members and with all the poultry producers of the county, was appointed.

"Every person owning a hen is invited to this meeting" is the announcement sent out over Union county. A special effort to induce Core and Union poultry growers to attend, is being made.

At that meeting it is hoped to form the nucleus of a county-wide organization to include all poultry producers in an agreement to "stand together for justice and fair prices for poultry products." If the association is formed, as planned, it is the intention, after organization is perfected, to call upon the merchants and meat dealers of La Grande, who handle eggs and poultry and try to arrive at an understanding and agreement whereby the producers and dealers may work together harmoniously and the producers may get a "living price" for their products.

An urgent call for all poultry producers who can possibly do so, to attend the meeting at Island City next Monday night, is being sent out over the county, as those sponsoring the movement declare the very existence of poultry production in Union county depends upon obtaining better prices for poultry products.
