Church Programs For Next Sunday Are Announced

Much Attention Given to Young People in Services; Special Meetings in Progress.

Programs in the local churches for next Sunday include the following:

Presbyterian Church (Sixth and Washington)
It will be profitable both for young and adult to attend the Sunday evening service at 7:30 o'clock, when the young people will present a program of unusual interest. The young folks will be in full charge. Every member is urged to be present at this service.

At the 11:00 o'clock hour, Sunday morning, the minister, Rev. J. George Watz, will present a sermon message for the benefit of all, more especially prepared for youth. The choir will sing and other features will make the service inspirational and helpful. In Paul Boylen, baritone, will sing the offertory solo. The sermon topic will be "In Christ I Found the Heart of God." Realizing our need for spiritual help and counsel, let us set out upon our journey to the house of God on Sunday morning. The Bible school convenes at 9:45 with class invitation to all ages. The regular attendance upon the school is most gratifying.

Young People's C. E. Forum meets at five o'clock, and the Christian Endeavorers at 6:30, closing in time for the 7:30 o'clock program.

St. Peter's Church (Episcopal) (Fourth street at O)
Services at St. Peter's church begin with holy communion at 8 and church school at 9:45 a. m., followed by morning prayer with sermon at 11. The musical program follows: "Prelude" by Fritz Kreisler; offertory, selected; postlude "Finale in A" by Harris. Evening prayer and meditation begin at 7:30 p. m. after Young People's Fellowship at 6:30 o'clock.

The personal religion class will meet in the chapel at 3 p. m. Monday. Holy communion will be held at 8 a. m. Thursday and announced on "Symbolism" begins at 10 a. m. the same day.

First Methodist Church (Spring and Fourth)
The 11 o'clock morning worship service will be in recognition of the visiting young people that are attending the mid-winter Epworth League institute. Beside the anthem by the chorus choir there will be a special offertory number. The pastor will speak on the subject "A Call To Youth." This morning worship service will close the institute.

The Epworth League meetings will be held in the usual places at 6:30.

There will be an evening worship service at 7:30, when the pastor will again be the speaker. Special musical feature, in addition to the congregational singing of the old familiar hymns.

First Church of Christ, Scientist (First and Washington)
Following Sunday school at 9:45 a. m. morning services are held at 11 o'clock. Wednesday evening services begin at 8 p. m. and the reading room in the West-Jacobson building is open daily from 1:30 to 5 p. m.

The subject of the Sunday service will be "Mind."

The golden text is "Be ye all of one mind, having compassion one of another, love as brethren, be pitiful, be courteous" (1 Pet. 3:8).

Among the citations which comprise the lesson-sermon is the following from the Bible: "Now I beseech you, brethren . . . that ye all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you" (1 Cor. 1:10).

The lesson-sermon also includes the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "The First Commandment, is my favorite text. It demonstrates Christianity. It indicates the trinity of God, Spirit, Mind; it signifies that man shall have no other spirit or mind but God, eternal good, and that all men shall have one Mind" (p. 340).

Central Church of Christ (Pennsylvania Avenue)
The Bible school of the Central Church of Christ has set its goal at 400, to have in attendance next Sunday morning at 9:45. In view of the large numbers that have been attending, all classes are making a special effort to reach this goal.

At the 11 o'clock worship service, the pastor, Rev. Paul De P. Mortimore, has announced that he will speak on the subject "Experiencing God." "The fool has said in his heart, there is no God," but any man who is honest and desirous of knowing the truth can easily demonstrate the folly of that statement. Mr. Mortimore says in announcing this subject: He believes that Sunday morning's sermon will be especially helpful to those who may have some questions regarding the existence of God. The communion will be served at this service as usual, and the choir will sing an anthem. Junior church will be held for children above ten years of age in the primary building.

Christian Endeavor meets at 6:15. Young people of the community are invited to attend these services which discuss vital problems of life.

"War in the Light of Prophecy" will be the subject of the sermon at 7:30. This is one of a series of sermons which the pastor is preaching on "prophecy being fulfilled today." In this sermon Mr. Mortimore announces that he will answer the individual who recently made the accusation through a local newspaper that "Christianity is responsible for war." The orchestra will play a concert as a prelude to the service, and singing of old favorite hymns will be enjoyed. The rites of Christian baptism will be administered at the close of the service. The public is cordially invited to all services of this church.

Gospel Mission (2301 North Fir Street)
Sunday services follow: Sunday school at 9:45 a. m. with classes for all. Morning worship is at 11 o'clock and the young people's and intermediate meetings are held at 6:45 p. m.

Evening services of evangelism begin at 7:30 o'clock.

Tuesday and Friday at 7:30 p. m. week night services will be held.

A week from Sunday, Mar. 4, revival meetings will begin with Evangelist Lillian E. Holm, of Tacoma, Wash., in charge.

All are invited to these meetings.

Salvation Army (221 Fir Street)
Tonight Adjutant and Mrs. Collier of Portland have charge of the meeting, which is especially dedicated to the young people.

A free and easy meeting will be held at 7:30 p. m. Saturday — a live meeting for people who want life.

Sunday's holiness meeting begins at 11 a. m. Captain Roddy will speak on "Why?" referring to the necessity of the Holy Ghost power in our lives today. At 2:30 p. m. Sunday school convenes — the contest for attendance and new members is continuing with much interest and enthusiasm.

At 6:30 the Y. P. Legion meets with Jack Brown and Florence Thompson in charge and the topic is "The Prime Minister — Joseph." The salvation rally is at 7:30 and the sermon theme will be "Modern Ways and a Modern Salvation."

Relief Work In Oklahoma Taken Over By Govt.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (AP)—The federal government took over relief administration in Oklahoma today and announced that \$5,000,000 would be spent to buy grain and livestock feed for farmers in drought areas of the west. Harry L. Hopkins, emergency relief administrator and civil works administrator, announced that Carl Giles has been named relief administrator in Oklahoma to act as his direct agent and that Governor W. H. Murray had been relieved of all responsibility. Murray late Wednesday announced that he would refuse to have anything more to do with the federal relief administration and that he was dismissing all his county social service workers.

PWA Asked For Funds To Build Interstate Span

PORTLAND, Feb. 23 (AP)—Eight applications for PWA projects, the largest calling for \$4,350,000 for the proposed interstate bridge at Astoria, were forwarded to Washington Thursday by the Oregon P. W. A. advisory board. The large Astoria project, it was estimated, would provide work for 855 men for 18 months. Other items included: Southern Oregon railroad from Perry, \$132,500; state psychopathic hospital at Portland, \$150,000; municipal dock at St. Helens, \$127,000; Columbia City water works, \$19,500; Clatsop High school, Lebanon grade school, and Oakridge water works, \$15,000 each.


