ASHTON, Idaho, Feb. 23 (AP)—With five Irish Setters, Do Cordingley, general Ashton musher, won the eighteenth annual American dog derby here yesterday in 31 minutes flat. There were 10 teams in the field. A crowd of 2,500 persons witnessed the event. The sleds were mounted on rubber-tired wheels because of the absence of snow and the race was run over a 12-mile stretch of highway.

Judge Knowles Revokes Parole Of Evans, Akoff

ENTERPRISE, Ore. (Special)—Judge J. W. Knowles in circuit court has revoked the parole of Frank Evans and Herbel Akoff, convicted in the late fall of 1932 of violating the state game laws by having elk meat out of season. They are supposed to be at Salem where they live, according to the Record-Chief.

The two Salem men were found early in September, 1932, by Game Warden George M. Rogers, in a hunting camp on Cheshinmuss ridge, and nearby was a lot of elk meat in process of being cured by the "jerking" process. They were found guilty of violation of the game laws after a long and hard fought trial, and the sentence was that each should serve three months in jail and pay a fine of \$500. However the court stipulated that they should be paroled if they paid their fines in full. The finding of the circuit court was affirmed by the supreme court.

Friends in Salem kept Evans and Akoff there as long as possible after the decision of the supreme court but at last they were brought back to Enterprise and placed in the county jail. They were released on condition they would pay their fines at the rate of \$30 a month until paid in full. Sheriff A. B. Miller says they made a few payments but are now back several months, hence the revocation of parole. It is supposed the two hunters will be brought back to Wallowa county unless they made up the payments on their fines.

PROTEST ACTION CHICKEN QUOTES

PORTLAND, Feb. 23 (AP)—Agitation against the action of the produce exchange here in continuing to quote the price on chickens 1c to 2c and even more below what the general trade is offering, was growing and especially so at country points.

The trade here gives several explanations for this course, the chief among them being the desire to stop the country sellers from consigning to Portland houses on commission and to keep the country sellers uninformed as to the real price.

There was again a spell of price

shading in the egg market despite the present low value. Some of the big stores were laying off in hope of forcing further price reduction. Quite liberal demand was showing for dressed turkeys and prices were being held steady considering quality. Real top stuff was scarce, the bulk of the supply being in second or third grade.
