

### LIQUOR IS LEGAL IN U. S. CAPITAL

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1 (AP)—Police dashed through the capital like modern Paul Revere early today to spread word of "legal liquor" after 17 years of prohibition.

Citizens by thousands cheered as police cars, sirens open, rushed to deliver retail liquor permits to 200 clubs, restaurants, hotels and night clubs. The dash started on the dot of midnight.

In the crowds at the nightspots were many of the personages who are nationally recognized by day. But the imbiber was orderly, and by local law the supply was shut off at 3:00 a. m.

Others waited for their first legal sip until 1,000 licensed retail establishments opened at 9 a. m. for sale by the drink.

The National Press club, whose license was No. 1, claimed to have popped the first proper cork.

### Scorchy Smith's Creator Dies In His Florida Home

CORAL GABLES, Fla., Mar. 1 (AP)—John C. Terry, comic artist and a pioneer in animated cartoon films, died here Tuesday night. He came here last fall from New York, suffering from a kidney ailment.

Mr. Terry created "Scorchy Smith," boy aviator strip, for the Associated Press feature service four years ago and the feature has achieved widespread success. It will be carried on by Noel Sickles, who had collaborated with Mr. Terry recently.

### FEBRUARY IN VALLEY SETS TWO RECORDS

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to date is seven inches. Just for comparison, here are the Februaries that somewhat rival the month just passed:

February, 1906—Snow (traces) one day, maximum temperature 49, minimum 13 above.

February, 1920—Traces of snow two days, maximum 61, minimum 18 above.

February, 1924—Traces of snow four days, maximum 89, minimum 22 above.

February, 1925—Traces of snow two days, maximum 55, minimum 21 above.

And here's February, 1934—No snow, maximum 62, minimum 25 above.

During the month there were only nine days that saw the minimum below freezing point, 19 days saw the maximum 50 or higher, with four days 60 or higher. Nine days were clear, five partly cloudy and 14 cloudy.

Rainfall amounted to .94 of an inch, compared with normal of 1.87. It brought the 1934 rainfall to 3.29 inches, which is below normal of 4.08 for the months of January and February, a deficit of .79 of an inch.

And up at Meacham, where usually there is piles of fresh snow at this time of the year, only 14 inches of snow fell during the month!

### M'NARY SUPPORTS WILD GAME PLAN

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1 (AP)—Senator McNary (R., Ore.) today added his endorsement to the plan of the president's committee on wild life restoration to acquire 5,000,000 acres of submarginal land for propagation purposes and urged that Malheur and lower Klamath lakes on the Oregon-California border be included.

"I am 100 per cent behind the committee, which if supported by the president can be the means of bringing relief to untold numbers of hard pressed farmers now striving to eke out an existence on submarginal lands in the northwest," McNary said.

### Foreign Exports At Portland In 23 Pct. Increase

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—Foreign exports through the port of Portland in February showed a 23 per cent increase in value over the corresponding month a year ago, the merchants' exchange announced. Bookings fully as heavy for March were predicted.

In the month ended the total value of foreign shipments from Portland was \$2,314,369, compared to \$1,957,656 for February last year.

The gain was attributed to several factors, among them being the better exchange balance of the government's subsidy program for clearing out the northwest's wheat surplus.

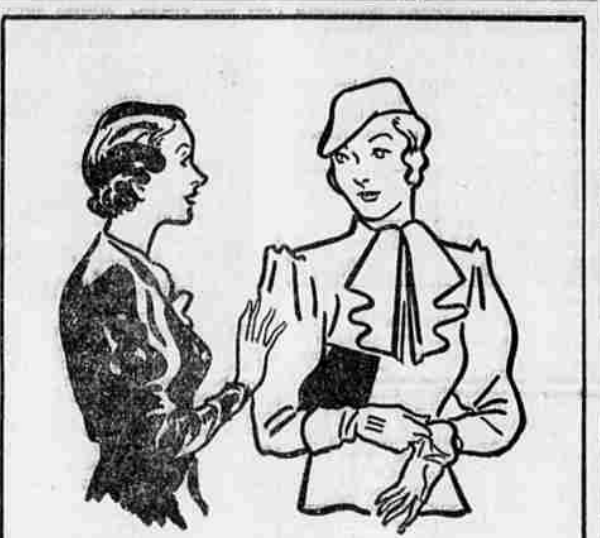
