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## CONGRATULATIONS, UNION

Union again will be host to the eight high school basketball teams in the play-off for the championship of district No. 1, and the coveted trip to Salem to participate in the state tournament. The eight teams qualifying for the tournament made the decision, five voting for Union and three for La Grande. It seems to us to be an unquestionably fair way to dispose of the tournament question, with the schools alone having the say, and outside interests in the background—as they should be. After all, the tournament is a school affair and they should have the final say.

The vote for Union not only showed the preference of the majority of the teams to hold the tournament there, but it also came as a vote of confidence for Roy Conklin, superintendent there, who has managed basketball tournaments and track meets so many times and so efficiently in the past.

Many La Grande people unquestionably desired to have the tournament here this year, yet we are sure that the entire community joins heartily with us in extending sincere congratulations to Union in its selection to again be host to the eight best basketball teams in this district.

## AN ANNIVERSARY OF NOTE

A year ago today was an auspicious occasion in La Grande history and marked a new turning point in this community's progress and prosperity. 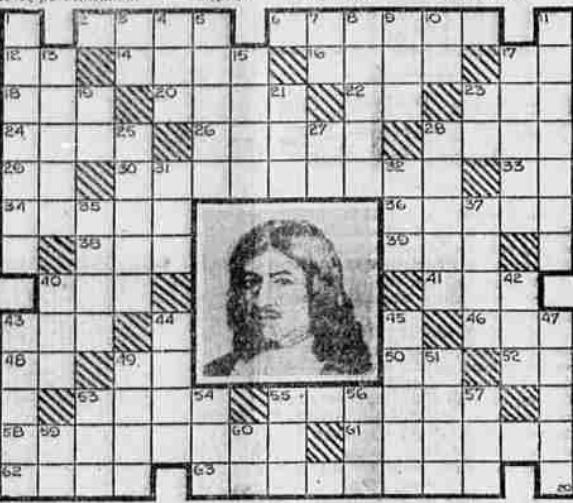
