## Shoulders Slope In New Skin Clinging Mode

By Rita Ferris (Associated Press Fashion Editor) PARIS (AP) — Sloping shoulders are here. The old squared shoulders which took the style world by storm have been supplanted by a new mold. The shoulders which appear on the new frocks — and which stylists predict will be seen in the 1934 spring models — cling almost as closely to the wearer as her skin. Breaking from the close high throatline seen on numerous frocks, many of them give the effect of a bottle or vase neck. Some are designed without any shoulder seam at all. Trend Toward Femininity They are all part of the definite trend to femininity which has marked the new mode and which turns its back on angles. Ingenuity is required to give grace to the new line, since the idea is to make the frock fit as smoothly over the shoulders as a cape. Latest designs frocks of black satin and greyed hyacinth crepe which slope from the neck to a point on the sleeves between shoulders and elbow without a seam. The seam appears only at this midway point on the arm. Variations in Mode Bruyere makes a very short sleeved pale blue crepe spring frock with sleeves which just cap over the shoulder. Other designers work with a raglan seam or the regulation shoulder seam pressed as flat as possible.
