CORVALLIS, Ore., Mar. 5 (P)—The University of Oregon basketball team made it three out of four over Oregon State and took second place in the coast conference northern division race by beating the Beavers 24 to 31 here Saturday night.

The Webfoots long-shot to victory in a rollicking game little impeded by whistle tooting. Close checking kept both teams from scoring consistently, there being few chances for open shots.

The game was spectacular, the ball habitually coming close but missing. Three times the score was tied and never more than four points divided the teams. In the second half Oregon never led more than three points. Oregon State tied the score in the first half but Willie Jones put Oregon ahead with a short shot and the Webfoots held a 14 to 12 advantage at half-time.

In the second half MacDonald tied the score at 14 to 14 and Captain Robertson sent a rafter roaming through the net to return Oregon to the lead. The Beavers tied the count again when Polen dropped in a neat one-handed shot. But once more Robertson split the net with a long shot.

The Webfoots were in a precarious position when Bud Jones went out on fouls and the Staters were pressing hard. But Kourze who replaced Jones caged two long shots which salted the game for Oregon.

From the cellar and only two victories last year to second place and nine victories this season is the record for Oregon. Oregon State ended in third place, but was the only conference team to win from the championship University of Washington team.

U. S. C. made it two straight over Idaho Saturday night to escape a cellar tie.

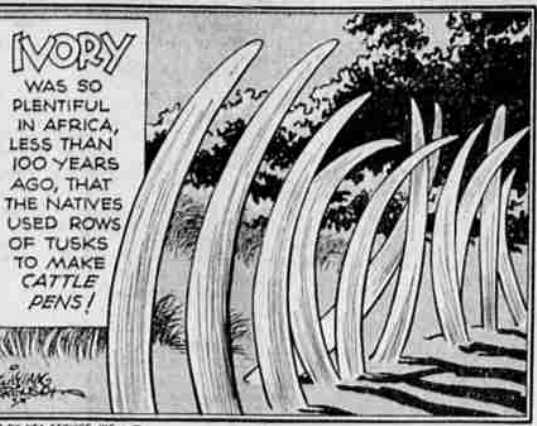

HANZEN WILL EXPLAIN EGG GRADING LAW

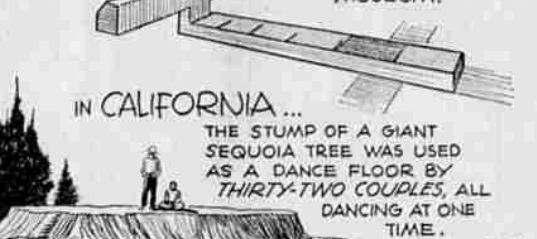

Rattlesnake Hunt Newest Thrill In 'Outdoor Sports'

MORAN, Tex. (P)—Rattlesnake hunting is the newest, most exciting and dangerous sport to become popular in West Texas.

There is no lack of game, for rattlers are native to this portion of the southwest and may be found almost anywhere. A special technique, however, is required to trap them during their winter hibernation in rocky crags and hillsides.

Where years past saw groups of 100 or so hunting the reptiles on Christmas day, the day set aside by custom for such adventures, now every warm Sunday afternoon finds numerous parties in the field.

Unaffected by dynamite Snakes basking in the sunshine on the rocks give the hunters clues as to location of the quarry's den. Then if the runway to the den is too narrow to permit pulling the reptiles out, dynamite is used to blast a larger opening. Long steel hooks are employed to fish the rattlers from their hiding places. They seem unaffected by the explosion, and sometimes as many as 50 are pulled from one hole.

Although the snakes are only semi-active while in hibernation, they strike as quickly and with as deadly effect as in the warm months.

Thrill For Visitors Ben Hubbert, pioneer resident of this section, is credited with starting the rattlesnake hunting fad. Despite the large numbers killed, the pests still abound.

To add to the sport, natives frequently take visitors along. The usual reaction of a "tenderfoot" to the sight of a five-foot diamond-black being hauled fighting and striking from the rocks is "Give me room!"

LOST SHOE FAILS TO CHECK TWO-MILE STAR

MADISON, Wis. (P)—Friends here of Johnny Follows, English-born athlete who this winter has been hailed as America's greatest two-miler, recall an incident attesting his courage.

It was in the Big Ten indoor track championships at Minneapolis in 1930. Follows lost a shoe on the first lap, but continued through the remaining 15 laps barefooted to take second place.

Follows never won a Big Ten title while University of Wisconsin student, but was rated a better than average distance man. He won his Dark Blue at Oxford after finishing his studies here.
