

TROJANS SCORE 27-25 WIN OVER HUSKY QUINTET

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 10 (AP)—Southern California's basketball quintet was within one game of the Pacific Coast championship today with little assurance it could expect to sail away the title in the second contest of the playoff series with Washington tonight.

Captain Sam Barry's Trojans won 27-25 last night by staying off a riot-out closing rush of the Huskies after they apparently had tied the victory up in a bundle. In the first half, ready to take home.

The smart ball-possession game, which put Southern California out in front 18 to 7 in the first twenty minutes, suddenly went to pieces in the last five minutes of play but Coach Clarence (Doc) Edmundson's five hit it stride seconds too late.

While Southern California was holding Don Glaser to two meager points, its own star, Lee Outturo, went on a scoring spree by connecting with seven field goals and a trio of charity baskets for 17 points.

Coach Edmundson hopes he will have his full strength on the court tonight. Clyde Wagner, captain, center, played through the first three minutes despite a stomach disorder which kept him in bed most of yesterday, but was forced to retire in favor of Dick Merrin, who finished the contest.

Medford Noses Out Ashland Five

Medford, Mar. 10 (AP)—Playing with only two regular first starters, Medford high school edged out a thrilling 20 to 24 victory over the Ashland basketball team here last night in a five-minute overtime period.

The Medford win gave each team a game in the three-game division tournament. A third game will be played on a neutral floor next Friday. The winner will represent Southern Oregon in the state finals at Salem.

Sport Slants

Evidently the nights are long and blustery out in the great open spaces of the northwest this winter, but they have their compensations.

Our faithful northwest scout, Dick Powers, has been seeking up some "remember when" of famous football happenings, along with a lot of heat from the base burners, and he forwards a few gems of Minnesota reminiscence to wit and awe as follows:

"Roger Wheeler, captain of the 1920 Gopher gridgers, was eating in a restaurant with a friend the other day. A stranger broke into the conversation and began giving the 'low-down' on football for the past several years. By chance he mentioned the 1920 team, which incidentally had a perfect record, and loudly told how it should have been improved.

"After 10 minutes of this, Wheeler made some remark and the stranger snapped back, 'What do you know about it?' Wheeler made no reply but his friend leaned over and whispered in the stranger's ear. The stranger vanished.

Barely Stopped In Time
"And do you remember the time Captain Wheeler was taken out of the Minnesota-Wisconsin game, after playing a standout game, with the score 10 and 9 for Wisconsin? Wheeler went to the dressing room and was taking a shower when word came in that Mally Nydahl had made a 75-yard run for a touchdown and a 10 to 10 win for the Gophers in the closing seconds.

Two policemen caught Wheeler in the absolute nude, at the edge of the track—and rushed him back into the dressing room—just as he was making a bee-line for the field.

Pharm's Tying Kicks
"It was during the Minnesota-Notre Dame game at South Bend in 1927. Notre Dame was leading 7 to 0 in the last quarter when Minnesota rushed over a touchdown, bringing the score 7-0.

"Art Pharo, stellar place kicker, had got to play for only a few minutes previously and was 'grouchy' about it. He knew Doc Powers would call on him to kick the point, and he hid in the blankets when he saw the portly doctor coming. However, he was coaxed out and sent into the game. Just as he was trotting out on the field, he turned and came back to Powers and snarled, 'Bet you a dollar I make it, Doc.' And then he went out and kicked the point, bringing the Gophers a 7 to 7 tie. Nobody knew whether Doc ever paid.

"Interference, Fellow Men!
"And the time Minnesota was playing at Iowa City. Bronko Nagurski, versatile All-America fullback, played as tackle throughout the first three scoreless quarters. He was taking a bad riding from the Iowa forwards and, lifting of their remarks, told them, 'I'm going back there at full-back for a moment.'

"Nagurski took his place in the backfield, the ball was snapped to him, and without swerving he drove straight ahead for 33 yards and a touchdown—right through his previous tackle opponent."

LEVINSKY LOSES TO WALT NEUSEL

NEW YORK, Mar. 10 (AP)—It seems Madison Square Garden will need to look elsewhere than at King Levinsky for a suitable opponent to meet Heavyweight Champion Primo Carner in the summer.

Dean Brothers and Martin Give Cards Corner on "Color" Market

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Jerome Dean's little brother Paul is coming up for a trial with the Cardinals this spring, and St. Louis fans are looking forward to some happy, if not hilarious, days at the ball yard.

Together with the irrepressible Pepper Martin, the "Wild Horse of the Ganges" who ran the Athletics ragged in the 1931 world series, this newest big time brother act promises to make the Redbirds a three-ring circus so far as that much-sought element, "color," is concerned.

The Dean boys are enough alike in size and shape to be twins. Jerome, "Dizzy" towering 6 feet 3 1/2 inches and tipping the beam at 189 pounds, at against Paul's 6 feet 3 inches and 192 pounds. Paul is 20 years old and Dizzy is 23, according to the best available information, although Dizzy's natal date has been the subject of some dispute.

Just how the Dean brothers will "see" when hooked up in double harness on the same team is a matter for conjecture, but it is pretty evident there's no professional rivalry between them.

"I'm afraid I won't be the best pitcher in the league next season," was Dizzy's modest observation when he learned the Cardinals had bought Paul. "That boy's so good his fast ball makes mine look like a change of pace."
