Highly streamlined, its controllable pitch propellers and two V-type supercharged motors give it a cruising speed of more than 190 miles an hour.

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occurs, by the end of this summer. Since Meyers & Goulter have approximately 300 working days in which to complete their contract and probably equally generous time limits will be given on the last five miles, it is considered unlikely that the completed surfacing will be in place before the summer of 1936.

On the contract covered by the Dayton man, a 22-foot grade is being made and thus far no climb exceeding 3.5 per cent has been encountered. Surveys call for an easy, gradual climb all the way from the Grande Ronde valley to Tollgate, with curves also arranged for high speed travel.

The highway follows Little Phillips creek to its head a few miles beyond Tollgate, according to Mr. Eades. Quite a little rock work is required to keep the easy curvature and grade planned for the completed road. It will likely be finished first with a 16-foot surface and will afford a route from Walla Walla to Elgin about 60 miles shorter than the present road via Pendleton Meacham and La Grande.

Big Area Served

Increased use of the Blue mountain region represented in the Umatilla national forest, as a summer camping and recreation area has resulted from completion of a first class road from Weston to Tollgate, about half the distance from Weston to Elgin. The new road on the opposite side of the mountains will open the Tollgate area and Skyway drive to the residents of La Grande, Elgin and the Grande Ronde and Walla Walla region.

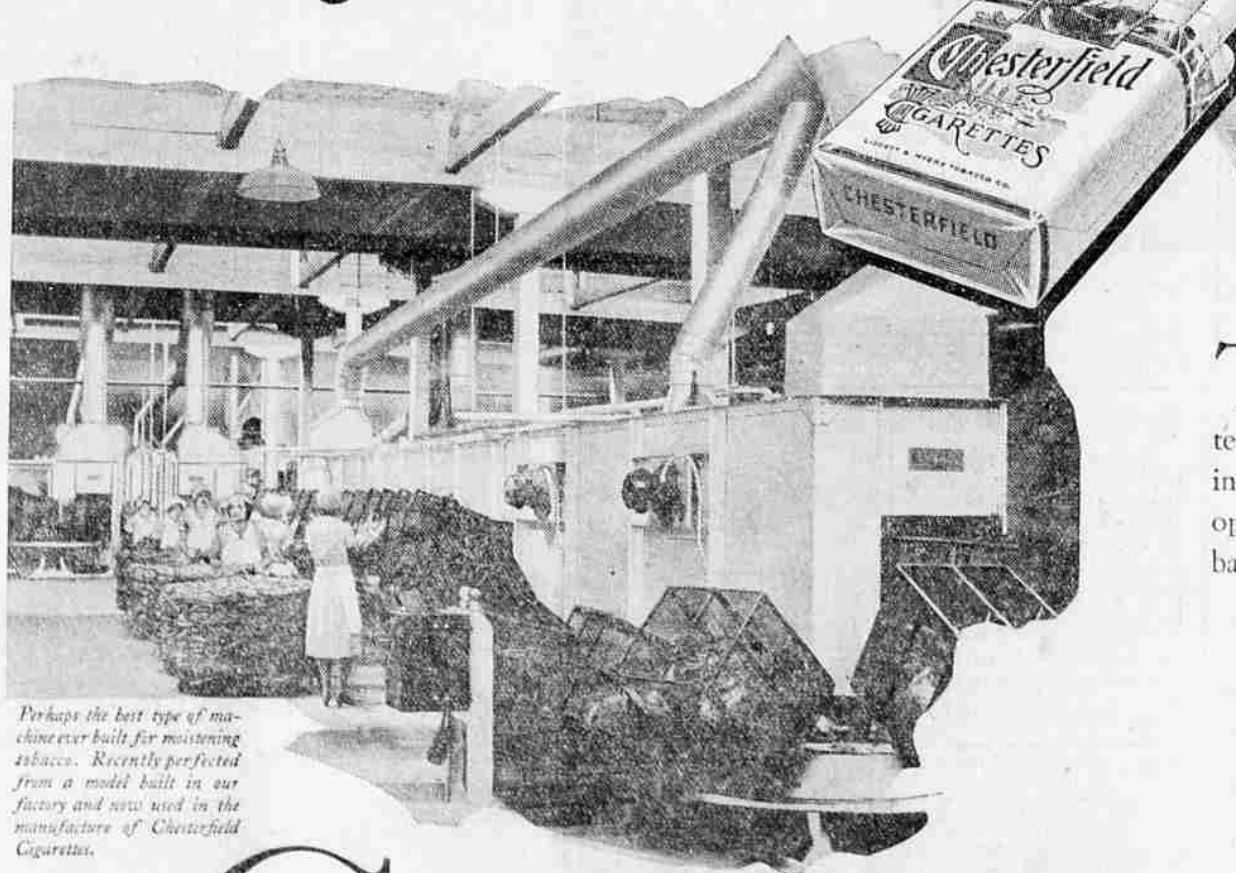
