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## 14 SAILORS SAVED FROM NAVY BOAT

SABRO, Japan, Mar. 13 (AP) — Thirteen sailors snatched from a sinking ship today by the boats of the Japanese torpedo boat Tamao, captured with 13 men aboard, imprisoned in walls of steel, with some of them strapped across their chests, the men were seen today when they were freed.

None of the 13 men were of the 113 crew on the woodhull liner of the line Sailing vessel, owned by Capt. Brock, who was captured at the drydock, where the crew was held. The men were still wearing their uniforms when they were taken out of the ship.

Mr. Tuttle conducted a stage station at Willow creek near Elgin where he made his home until his death, and also served in the state legislature in 1882. He died in 1919.
