Producers pay nothing for the candling. They get more for their eggs than before—every little fluctuation in Portland prices is not felt here. The arrangement already has brought a small profit to the egg business that a week ago was losing money."

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maintenance of rural schools up to June 1, were today sent to Governor Meier for signature.

Elmer Coudy, state emergency relief administrator, announced that the affidavits, drawn up by C. A. Howard, state superintendent of public instruction, are in line with a general educational relief program all over the country.

The statements will be forwarded at once to Harry L. Hopkins, federal relief administrator, as soon as they are signed by the governor. The funds will be available immediately. Under this program all schools serving communities of less than 5000 population, unable to operate until June despite greatest efforts of directors to obtain funds for maintenance, will be eligible for this money which will be used to pay teachers' salaries.

Superintendent Howard has estimated Oregon's needs at \$255,000 and this amount probably will be authorized by Washington, D. C.

The "milky way," explained Mr. Gralapp, is nothing more than a great nebula of stars or suns, any one of which is as large or larger than our sun and though they look together in a great mass, are in reality thousands and millions of miles apart.

Flashes from the sun have been noted through telescopic measurement to have leaped as high as 80,000 miles away from the sun proper out into space. Light from the sun reaches the earth in a little over eight minutes, traveling at the rate of around 186,000 miles a second.

Our moon is 240,000 miles from us. Some planets have several moons but the earth has but one. Mars is the closest planet. The earth is the third member of our particular group of planets in distance from the sun. Jupiter, Saturn, Venus, Mars and other planets of the system of which the earth is a part, revolve around our sun.
