

NAME WOODIE ON EASTERN OREGON DISTRICT BOARD

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 15 (Special) — May 19 has been selected as the date of the 1934 Oregon High School Athletic association's track and field championships. This year's meet will be staged under the auspices of the Oregon State college.

John L. Gary, secretary of the association, has announced the names of the committees to handle the eight sectional meets to be staged prior to the state championship, which, as in the past few years, will be determined by districts rather than individual schools.

Outside of the Portland district, each will be allowed to enter two men in each event. The Portland district will be allowed four men in each event.

The following events have been listed: 100 yards, 220 yards, 440 yards, half mile, mile, 110-yard high hurdle, 22-yard low hurdle, high jump, broad jump, discus, javelin, shot put, pole vault and 1 1/2-mile four-man relay.

Points will be awarded as follows: First place, 5; second place, 3; third place, 2; and fourth place, 1.

The districts and the committees appointed include:

District No. 1 — Willamette, Union, Baker, Malheur, Morrow and Umatilla counties. Chairman: Ira Woodie, La Grande. Try Walker, Baker, and Dean Lohmeyer, Pendleton.

District No. 2 — Wasco, Gilliam, Wheeler, Harney, Hood River, Sherman, Jefferson, Deschutes, Grant and Crook counties. Chairman: H. R. Johnson, Bend. Burt Holsten, The Dalles, and George Blinnig, Burns.

The school district limits ask warrants to a teacher, although occasionally an emergency base is allowed an extra one or two. To balance this many receive only one or two. As it is around 400 are issued monthly, and if the figure was much higher, the school clerk's office would have little time to do anything else except issue warrants register them, post them in the minute book, figure interest on each when called, etc.

County, city and school district officials all agree that if the number of warrants were unlimited, it would create a serious problem in many ways.
