Second quarter taxes are due June 15, third quarter Sept. 15 and fourth quarter Dec. 15.

Federal income tax payments also are due today, and C. Lloyd Walsh, deputy internal revenue collector here, plans to have his office in the federal building open until midnight. State income taxes are due April 1.

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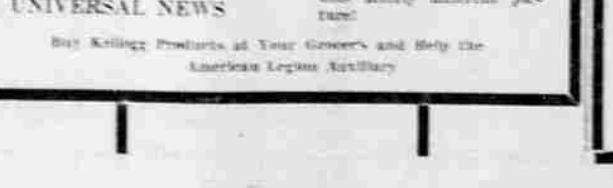
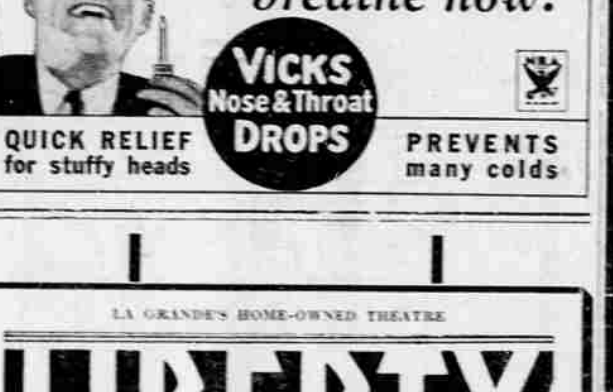
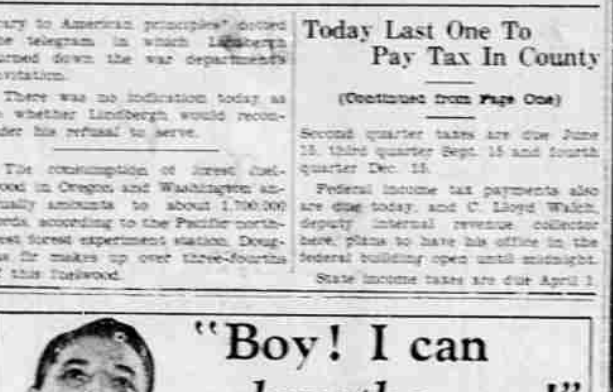
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
