PIRATES GUNNING FOR PENNANT IN NATIONAL LEAGUE

PASO ROBLES, Cal., Mar. 16 (AP) — Pittsburgh's Pirates are going gunning for the National league prize this season with high hopes that a newcomer to the crew will mean the difference between first place and the runner-up position they have occupied the last two years.

The burly baseballer in whose experience Manager George Gibson is placing considerable spring training trust is Charles "Red" Lucas, late of the Cincinnati Reds pitching corps and a pinch hitter who really "hits in the pinches."

Lucas landed with the Pirates after eight years with the Reds. Manager Gibson reasons the broad shouldered right hander should bolster his hurling staff almost on the strength of his 1933 record. For a tall end club, "Red" won 10 games and lost 16. His pinch hitting is expected to provide one of the hot spots of the Pirates attack. During his eight year tenure, Cincinnati, Lucas compiled a pinch hitting grand average of around 400. He hit for .287 in 83 games last season.

Aside from the addition of Lucas, the Pirate squad of regulars is identical to that which last season led the pennant parade part of the time and trailed the Giants in the finish.

Manager Gibson believes his team will be as tough as any. He thinks his outfield compares with any in the league. It lines up the Water brothers, Paul and Lloyd, and Fred Lindstrom. Lloyd Water may be shifted from left to center field this season, a position he held down regularly until Lindstrom came over from the Giants a year ago. Lindstrom is equally at home in left. Forester's purposes, Forest Jensen and Walter Roettger are available. Roettger came with Lucas in the Cincinnati swap for Adam Conerzky and Tony Piet.

The infield combination has been proven, with Gus Suhr at first, Tom Brown at second, Floyd Vaughn at short and the reliable "Pie" Traynor at third.

Harry Lavagetto, promising recruit, was purchased from Oakland of the Coast league but is hardly expected to dislodge the veteran Traynor who last season surprised everyone, including himself, by hitting .312, in addition to turning in a great fielding performance.

Behind the plate Earl Grace and Hal Finney claim first and second string positions respectively with Tom Padden, also a holdover, battling a newcomer, Art Velman, for the third berth. Velman, drafted from Oakland, has shown impressively. He hit .351 last year.

The pitching staff offers but few worries. Lucas, the most recent addition to the payroll is a certain starter, as will be Harold Shultz, Larry French, the star southpaw, and probably Ralph Barker, another left hander who was recalled from Toronto to last mid-season and produced satisfactorily.

fact and said the present question was to substitute "them."

Senator Barbour (R., N. J.) brought up that section of the bill prohibiting contractors whose contracts were annulled from bidding on new contracts unless they waived any claims against the government.

Lindbergh called that clause the most "unjust section ever placed in American legislation."

He expressed the view that the section with regard to pay would "limit the size of plants carrying the mail."

"I feel it is to the best interests of American aviation," he said, "to encourage the use of large planes when the traffic calls for it."

McKellar said the legislation as he read it was not intended to limit the size of planes, but Senator Logan (D., Ky.) said the language with regard to pay might limit the size.

Lindbergh, questioned by McKellar as to his financial connections with air companies, said he received \$5,000 a year from Transcontinental and Western Air up to the first of this month and \$10,000 a year from Pan-American Airways.

McKellar asked the extent of his holdings of stock. Lindbergh said he didn't recall, but they were all listed in replies to a questionnaire from the Black committee.

McKellar asked if he knew anything about the events leading up to the cancellation of the contract.

"Very little," he said.

"Did you attend any meetings?"

"No sir."

"To me our understanding. Now if these contracts were bought, you are for them and if they are not you would not condone them."

"I feel," Lindbergh said, "these companies have the right to trial before being convicted of guilt which is only implied and not proven."

While Lindbergh testified, Richard Whitney, president of the New York stock exchange, submitted to the banking committee down the hall, a complete report on transactions in air stocks prior to cancellation of the mail contract.

Lindbergh said the army air corps was "not designed" for moving mail emergencies, as carriage of the mail and had not had "adequate time to study the route."

Senator Schall (R., Minn.) said he had been told that it would cost the army around \$30,000,000 a year to carry the mail where the private companies had carried it for about \$14,000,000 but the witness said he had no information on this.

LUMBER BUSINESS CONTINUES GAINS

PORTLAND, Mar. 16 (AP) — New business totaling 48,393,000 feet, about 9 per cent over the previous week, and 10 per cent greater than the three-year weekly average for March, was reported here today by the Western Pine association for the week ending March 10.

Shipments for the week were 37,000,000 feet, and production, 29,525,000 feet. Production increased 2,475,000 feet over the week before. Current orders were 166 per cent greater than orders accepted for the corresponding week a year ago.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 16 (AP) — The National Lumber Manufacturers association said today reports from 1,323 lumber mills for the week ending March 10 showed orders exceeding any week since November, and with the exception of two peak weeks in that month, the greatest since last June.

Orders for the week totaled 212,290,000 feet, compared with 210,770,000 feet the previous week.
