MEAT SUBSTITUTE FOR DINNER
Rice or bread custard pudding spread with a tart jelly or jam and then topped with meringue makes a tempting dessert and a substantial one, too.
Dinner Menu
Cheese Pudding
Baked Sweet Potatoes
Buttered Cabbage
Date Muffins
Pear Salad
Butter
Wafers
Coffee
Cheese Pudding
3 tablespoons butter
4 tablespoons flour
2 cups milk
2-3 cup cheese, cut fine
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon finely chopped onion
1/2 teaspoon finely chopped celery
1/2 teaspoon finely chopped parsley
2 egg yolks
2 egg whites, beaten
1-4 teaspoon paprika
Melt butter and add flour. Add milk and cook until creamy. Stir constantly. Add cheese, seasonings and yolks. Beat 2 minutes. Fold in whites. Pour into buttered baking dish. Sprinkle with paprika. Set in pan of hot water and bake 30 minutes in moderate oven.
Date Muffins
2 cups pastry flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
4 tablespoons sugar
1-4 teaspoon salt
1 cup milk
1 egg
1/2 cup dates, chopped
2 tablespoons fat, melted
Mix ingredients. Beat one minute. Half fill greased muffin pans and bake 15 minutes in moderate oven.
Pear Salad
4 halves pears
1/2 cup dried celery
1-4 cup nuts
1-8 teaspoon salt
1-8 teaspoon paprika
5 tablespoons salad dressing
Chill ingredients. Arrange pears on lettuce and top with remaining ingredients. Serve immediately.

direct loans to private business. The bills were introduced by Chairman Fletcher and Steagall of the senate and house banking committees. The lending powers of the credit banks would include: To discount for, or purchase from, any bank, trust company, mortgage company, credit corporation for industry, or other financing institution operating in its district, obligations having maturities not exceeding five years, entered into for the purpose of obtaining working capital for any established industrial or commercial business. To make loans directly to any such institutions on the security of such obligations. To make commitments with regard to such discount or purchase of obligations or with respect to such loans, including commitments made in advance. In exceptional circumstances, when it appeared that an established industrial or commercial business was "unable to obtain requisite financial assistance on a reasonable basis from the usual sources" to loan direct to such business, up to five years. To assist in effectuating plans for the reorganization or refinancing of a business and act as receiver for it. In all cases in which loans were made through a bank or other financing institution, the intermediate agency would have to obligate itself for 20 per cent of any loan. Credit banks would be chartered by the reserve banks and operated subject to the regulations of the reserve board. They would continue in existence for a period to be determined by the reserve board, and could set up branches. The treasury would provide the original capital for the banks by buying from federal reserve banks, out of gold devaluation profits, stock subscribed by the reserve banks in the federal deposit insurance corporation. This money would be used by the reserve banks to set up the credit agencies. The credit banks could augment their capital by sale of stock and issue debentured up to five times their capital and surplus.
