STOCK EXCHANGE SEATS IN TUMBLE

NEW YORK, Mar. 21 (AP)—The price of New York stock exchange seats tumbled sharply today, in the first transactions since proposed federal legislation to regulate securities trading took definite form.

The exchange announced that one transfer was arranged at \$110,000, and another at \$100,000. The last previous transfer was Feb. 3, at \$190,000.

In 1933, the price of seats fluctuated between \$90,000 and \$250,000.

Little action ever taken against pictures delineating criminal exploits" by J. J. McCarthy, chairman of the advertising advisory council of the Hays organization.

"It undoubtedly will tend to decrease the production of criminal pictures," McCarthy said.

Hays' action, announced yesterday, not only prohibited the making of a Dillinger picture by companies in his organization, but also banned their distribution or exhibit of such a film.

"It means," McCarthy said, "that if some company outside this organization makes a Dillinger film, they would have no place to show it."

The Hays organization represents 90 per cent of the industry, McCarthy said.

CHEVROLET CO. SETS RECORDS IN PRODUCTION

During the first week of March, Chevrolet produced 18,225 units, it was announced today by Norman Press, of the Larson-Press Chevrolet Co. here. From March 8 to 14, 22,601 units were produced—an increase of 24 per cent over the previous week, and on Tuesday, Mar. 13, Chevrolet set a new high daily record of 4,521 units, he said. From Mar. 1 to 15, one thousand one-half ton and one and one-half ton panel units were built, the best panel body record in Chevrolet history.

Another satisfactory record, Mr. Press reports, was made by the axle plant when it produced 4,514 "knee action" assemblies in one day. Concerning the Chevrolet "knee action" wheels, he pointed out several interesting features. First, Chevrolet's method of individual front-wheel suspension is a patented system. Second, it is the most costly type used in the United States. Some of the advantages these knee units have follow: King pins are "fixed"—that is, they are fastened to the frame and are carried on needle bearings, thus providing true shockless steering. Also, the spring units are entirely enclosed; Chevrolet units are permanently and entirely lubricated because they operate in a bath of lubricating fluid; the construction prevents excessive change in tread or "tire scrubbing"; and the unit is much simpler in construction. Mr. Press says this type of suspension is much better than is used in any other type for a light car.
