

# High School Baseball Schedule Is Drawn Up

## TIGERS TO OPEN COUNTY SEASON AT COVE APRIL 6

La Grande, Imbler, Elgin and Cove in Diamond League — Local Prospects Appear Good.

The schedule for the Union county high school baseball league was drawn up at a meeting of school men here last night, representing the four entries—Imbler, Cove, Elgin and La Grande.

La Grande plays its first three games—half of the schedule—away from home, because of the condition of the athletic field now under construction. But beginning April 27 the Tigers will make a stand on their home lot, winding up with the sixth and final league game May 11.

All games are scheduled on Fridays. The schedule follows:

April 6—La Grande at Cove; Elgin at Imbler.

April 13—La Grande at Elgin; Imbler at Cove.

April 20—La Grande at Imbler; Cove at Elgin.

April 27—Elgin at La Grande; Cove at Imbler.

May 4—Imbler at La Grande; Elgin at Cove.

May 11—Imbler at Elgin; Cove at La Grande.

Last year was La Grande High's first venture in baseball. The Tigers winning only one out of six games, but making a good showing at that. Several veterans are on hand this year and Robert Dixon, faculty member in charge of the team, is expecting a winning combination. The outlook for all departments—pitching, catching, infield, outfield and hitting—appears good at this stage of the season. The Tigers have been limbering up since January, and right now are working largely on hitting and infield practice.

Lettermen back this year include Cecil Walden, catcher and Charles Young, pitcher; Tom Zivkovich, first; Arlen Beck, second; Sheldon Hyde, shortstop and Fred Leonard, leftfield. Others working out—and several of them had experience last year but not enough to win a letter—include: Maurice Robertson, John Elings, Robert Koyle, Phillip Leonard, Tom Blackman, Wayne Goodenough, Hugh-ey Irwin, Bud Reynolds, Victor Bean, Howard Beck, Herbert Voruz, James Vozel, Chester Davis, Robert Arnoldus (formerly of Imbler High), Burt Courtney. Some of the above had experience also in American Legion Junior league play.

There also are prospects of scheduling games later in the season with Baker if Baker has a team—and with Walla Walla High school.

SALEM, Mar. 22 (AP) — Hairbreadth margins sent four of the eight successful basketball teams into the championship flight at the 15th annual state tournament which opened here yesterday, while the other four had less trouble disposing of their competitors. Eight teams were thus eliminated from any of the first four places, but still remain in the consolation series.

Franklin High of Portland closed the first day's session by a single point margin over McMinnville, 15 to 14.

Salem had less trouble with Pendleton, 33 to 26, but little Dean Galloway scored 19 points for Eastern Oregon to take the high honors for the day. Eugene was forced to two overtime periods to win 33 to 30 over La Grande and only succeeded then when Danner, Eugene center, tossed a long one with but seconds to go.

Silveston put up a good battle against Klamath Falls, the latter playing without a single substitution, but were defeated 31 to 25. Astoria snowed Dallas under a 47 to 20 avalanche, while Jefferson High of Portland, appearing overstrained, succumbed to the fast quintet from The Dalles 35 to 38. Coquille and Ashland vanquished Mitchell and Columbia Prep earlier in the days.

A long field goal from the center line by Ford Danner, center, gave Eugene a victory over La Grande, 32 to 30, in the fifth game.

It required two overtime periods. Just two seconds before the final gun in the second extra session Danner made his perfect shot. It slipped through without hitting the iron bar. It was a nip-and-tuck battle with the lead alternating eight times.

La Grande led, 8 to 6, at the quarter, but gave way to Eugene, 14 to 12, at half-time. La Grande went up, 26 to 21, at the third session. It was tied, 30-30, at the final and remained there through the first overtime and until Danner's goal.

Stitt, La Grande forward, was high scorer with 16 points gained on eight field goals.

## NATIONAL LEAGUE TEAMS CHALK UP WINS OVER RIVALS

NEW YORK, Mar. 22 (AP) — If it weren't for the New York Yankees, the American league wouldn't even be a close second to the National in early returns from the annual "Grapefruit League" competition.

Twelve inter-league contests have been played so far and the American leaguers trail by a margin of only two games, seven to five. The Yankees, picking up the Boston Braves, have won four of their five victories. The other was chalked up to the credit of the Philadelphia Athletics who were beaten in five other jousts with National league outfits.

Setting the inter-league pace for John Hepler's loop are the world champion New York Giants and the Chicago Cubs. The Cubs have a perfect record against the American league with two successive triumphs over their city rivals, the White Sox, while the Giants have won four and lost one. The Brooklyn Dodgers earned the seventh National league victory, handing the A's one of their setbacks.

The Yankees, Boston Red Sox and Washington Senators alone have escaped defeat so far. Joe McCarthy's fustlers have won four in a row, all from the Braves. The Red Sox defeated the Detroit Tigers in the only game they have played so far, Washington hasn't even begun its exhibition schedule.

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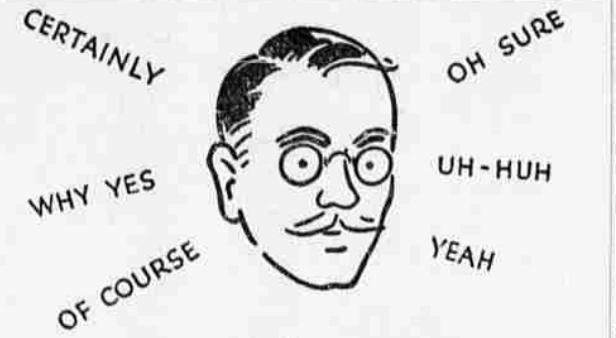
