Local Churches Make Plans For The Holy Week

Palm Sunday Observance Mar. 25—Good Friday on Mar. 30 and Easter Sunday April 1.

Churches throughout the La Grande community are making preparations for the observance of Palm Sunday on March 25, and also the following week which is Holy week, terminating in Good Friday on the 30th, before Easter Sunday the first of April.

Programs include:

Presbyterian Church (Sixth and Washington)
Palm Sunday is the last Sunday in Lent, the first day of Holy week and the Sunday immediately preceding Easter. It commemorates our Lord's triumphal entry into Jerusalem, accompanied by the multitude who greeted him with hosannas, waving palm branches and scattering them before him, as predicted by the prophet Zechariah 500 years before, and joyfully remembered 2000 years after. "The triumphal procession of Christ is still going on. Already it numbers countless millions, who have cast their talents, their money, their time, all that they possess, before him, to aid his cause, and hasten his second coming. To give proper recognition to this Holy day, the Sunday morning 11:00 o'clock service has been arranged around that thought," said the minister, bringing the Palm Sunday message based on the thought of "The Big Kingdom" members of the Order of Rainbow for Girls, will attend the service in a body and will occupy a reserved section in the auditorium. Appropriate music will be rendered by the choir, and Ralph Gebel, baritone, will sing "The Palms."

Bible school at 9:45 offers opportunity for all ages to study the truths and counsel of the Holy Book, with others of like age and under the instruction of competent teachers.

Young Peoples Forum at 5:00 p. m. and Christian Endeavor at 6:30 p. m. offer interesting programs and enjoyable fellowship to those of above high school age and those of high school age respectively. All are invited.

Church of Our Lady of the Valley (Rev. Thomas J. Brady, A. M., Ph. D., Pastor)

Next Sunday will be Palm Sunday and the masses on Good Friday at 8 and at 10 o'clock, with the pastor conducting both services. Owing to the length of the services prescribed by the ritual for Palm Sunday there will be no sermon at either mass. The sermon of the day will be preached in the evening at 7:30 by the pastor.

During the masses the Gospel concerning the Passion of Christ will be read in English. The blessing of the palms will take place before the 10 o'clock mass. After the blessing their distribution will take place and the second mass will proceed.

In the evening at 7:30, there will be rosary, litany, prayers and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. Palm Sunday initiates Holy Week.

The children who have not made their first communion and also those who have not been confirmed will have instructions in catechism next Saturday in the Lady Chapel at 10 o'clock in the morning.

On Thursday, Thursday and Saturday there will be special choir rehearsal of the children who belong to the chorus that will sing during the 6 o'clock mass on Easter Sunday morning. These rehearsals will take place in the Lady Chapel at 6:45 p. m. sharp, and last one half hour. The choir will be directed by the pastor.

All classes of people are welcome to assist at all services taking place in the cathedral church. (These church notices are official and they will not be changed in any particular).

First Methodist Episcopal Church (Spring and Fourth)

This is Palm Sunday, only one week until Easter and all the services for those who believe in the message of Easter. There will be special appropriate music provided by the chorus choir directed by Paul Knautz. The sermon subject for the morning service at 11 o'clock will be "Men's Greatest Motives" and for the evening service at 7:30 the subject will be "The Heroism of Despair."

The church Sunday school will meet at the regular hour of 9:45 and the Epworth League will meet at 6:30 in the evening.

Special services every night of Holy week except Saturday at 7:30. These services are planned for their worshipful values and are open to all who desire to make this meaningful period of greatest significance to their Christian experience.

Church of the Nazarene

Sunday school is at 9:45 a. m. and the morning worship begins at 11 o'clock. N. Y. P. S. meets at 6:45 p. m. and the evening service, with Rev. Josiah Tucker in charge, begins at 7:30 o'clock in the evening.

Island City Community Church

The morning preaching service at the regular 9:45 hour will be in charge of the pastor, Rev. W. H. Hertzog, who will speak on the subject "Memory, Loyalty, and Appreciation." The Sunday school will meet following the preaching service at 10:45. All in the community are urged to attend these services.

First Church of Christ, Scientist (First and Washington)

This church holds services at 11 a. m. following Sunday school at 9:45 o'clock. Wednesday evening meetings are at 8 o'clock and the reading room in the West-Jacobsen building is open from 1:30 to 5 p. m. daily.

The subject of Sunday's service will be "Matter."

Among the citations which comprise the lesson-reading at the following from the Bible: "They shall be as the morning cloud, and as the early dew that passeth away, as the chaff that is driven with the whirlwind out of the floor, and as the smoke out of the chimney. Yet I am the Lord thy God from the land of Egypt, and thou shalt know no god but me: for there is no saviour beside me" (Hosea 13: 3, 4).

The lesson-reading includes the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "Matter does not express Spirit. God is infinite omnipresent Spirit. If Spirit is all and is everywhere, what and where is matter?" "Nothing we can say or believe regarding matter is immortal, for matter is temporal and is therefore a mortal phenomenon, a human concept, sometimes beautiful, always erroneous." (pp. 223, 277).

Zion English Lutheran Church (M Avenue near Fourth)

Palm Sunday will be celebrated with fitting Scripture lessons, and the sermon will be "Hosanna in the Highest." The choir will sing the service, and Mildred Hoffman and Edith Loven will present a duet. The service begins at 11:00 a. m. and all who wish to attend will be cordially welcomed.

Sunday school convenes for worship and study at 9:45. The children are preparing a program "Easter Day" to be given next Sunday.

Marion Gehring will lead the Ladies League meeting Sunday evening at 7:00 o'clock, discussing the topic, "Missions." After the regular monthly meeting, Ruth Denison will present the fifth chapter of the Mission study book, "From Over the Border."

The congregation will observe Good Friday with a special service in the church at 7:30 p. m. All are urged to attend this service to commemorate the crucifixion of the Savior.

St. Peter's Church (Episcopal) (Fourth street at O)

Holy communion is at 8 and Sunday school at 9:45 a. m. followed by morning prayer with sermon at 11 o'clock. The musical program for the morning service follows: prelude "E Minor" by Chopin, offertory "The Palms" duet by Miss Verlie Felser and H. W. Guthrie, and postlude "Cortege" by Marchet. Young People's Fellowship at 6:30 p. m. precedes the evening prayer and meditation at 7:30 o'clock.

The personal religion class meets at 3 p. m. Monday in the chapel. Holy communion at 8 and an address on "Synbolism" at 10 a. m. are announced for next Thursday.

Gospel Mission

Sunday services follow: Sunday school at 9:45 a. m., morning service at 11:00 a. m., evening service at 7:30 p. m., and evening service of evangelism at 7:30 o'clock. Mrs. Holm, the evangelist, will speak on "The Soon Coming Rapture of the Bride of Christ and God's Terrible Judgments That Will Follow." Week-night services will continue each night except Saturday, the meetings beginning at 7:30 o'clock. All are invited to these services.

Baptist Church (Sixth and Spring)

At the Baptist church Sunday morning the pastor will take as his subject "The Spirit of Christ." An anthem, "Just As I Am" by Parks, will be sung by the choir. The subject of the evening sermon will be "Sowing and Reaping."

The topic for the young people's discussion is "What Does Jesus Require of Us?" Rutalia Edwards will be the leader.

There has been a fine increase in Bible school attendance. J. Jordaht is the efficient superintendent. A suitable class will be provided for anyone in attendance. Any not attending elsewhere are cordially invited to attend here.

Hours of services are: Bible school, 9:45; morning preaching service, 11:00; Junior B. Y. P. U., 6:30; Senior B. Y. P. U., 6:30; evening preaching service, 7:30; Thursday evening prayer meeting, 7:30.

Central Church of Christ (Pennsylvania avenue)

Special evangelistic services will continue at the Central Church of Christ through Holy week and Easter. These services which have been conducted during the past week have attracted some interest, and there have been several confessions to date. The pastor, Rev. Paul De P. Mortimore, is doing the preaching and conducting the services assisted by members of the local congregation. Sunday morning the sermon, in observance of Palm Sunday, will be titled "The Three Crowns of King." The communion will be served at this service and the choir will sing a special Palm Sunday anthem, "Prepare Ye the Way," by Ellen Jane Lorenz.

At 9:45 a. m. the Bible school is striving for an attendance of 400 for Palm Sunday. This school has maintained an especially high attendance record during the past six months. The goal for Easter Sunday has been set at 500, which is a considerably larger number than has ever attended.

MARKET AREAS AND MILK SHEDS

9. For the purpose of selling milk and cream, the market areas in Union County, Oregon, shall be that area lying within the city, town and community limits of the various incorporated and unincorporated cities, towns and communities, together with that territory extending within 1 mile of the city, town and community limits of the various incorporated and unincorporated cities, towns and communities.

For the purpose of supplying milk and cream in the above described market areas the boundaries of the milk sheds are hereby set as the city, town and community limits of the various incorporated and unincorporated cities, towns and communities, together with those producers who were actually shipping market milk or cream into said areas on Dec. 15, 1933.

This order shall become effective 12:01 a. m. Sunday, April 1, 1934. Charge accounts dating from March 1, 1934, may be billed at prices set in this order.
