True, the CWA during its existence over the winter brought relief to thousands placed upon its payrolls and thereby provided funds to the needy without the label of charity. In that light, it has been as meritorious as any done for the help of the unfortunate. In the light in which it was conceived and presented by its group of theorist moulders as one of the principal defenses in the scheme of things to defeat unemployment, it has failed.

With its conclusion this spring, it was heralded in its beginning as the means of tiding over to a re-establishment of normal employment. It has helped employment just so long as it and its funds have lasted in providing jobs. Those engaged by it have no new job with its ending nor have they gained through it any knowledge of new trade to fit them in some other channel than their former circumstance, were there opportunity.

As our Eugene editor further remarks, we seem to "have the bear by the tail but it is a question of who is being dragged." A costly experiment that in its real purpose has brought about as much satisfaction as can be found in any jumble of letters that does not spell or mean something.
