SALEM, Mar. 26 (AP) — The final game in the 19th annual state high school basketball tournament here, again saw the fighting Fishermen of Astoria perched on top of the heap; champions for the third time in the last five years. The Astorians attained the high place in state high school basketball by defeating the runner-up team, Klamath Falls, 24 to 13 Saturday night, after being on the short end of an 11 to 4 score at the half.

In the first game Saturday night, a smooth-working team from Astoria gave the other semi-finalist, Franklin High of Portland, an unexpected scare, losing to the Portlanders 24 to 28, and then only by virtue of the latter's ability to cash in on a free throw in the closing seconds. Franklin broke up the 23 to 23 tie by clogging dropping a basket from the gift strips.

At the close of the final game, Paul Jackson of Klamath Falls presented the trophies to the winners, and introduced members of the all-star team.

The distinction of being accorded the best sportsman in the tournament went to William Castellan, of Columbia Prep, and the most valuable player to his team, Robert Anet, of Astoria, who also was chosen as the first all-star team as guard.

CUBS TO GAMBLE ON CHUCK KLEIN AND FAST ROOKS

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 26 (AP) — Chicago's Cubs are going to gamble on Chuck Klein, National league batting champion of 1933, and a bunch of promising rookies for the added impetus they believe will carry them to the top in the 1934 pennant race.

Determined youth has been injected into the club in every department and Manager Charles Grimm feels confident their presence has improved the club both defensively and offensively.

In my years of baseball experience," said the genial Mr. Grimm, "I have never seen a pitcher with a finer change of pace." He was speaking of Dick Ward, who won 25 games to lead the Pacific coast league last year. And he rates Bill Lee, another right hander from the American association and Roy Johnson, of the west coast, almost as high.

He is sure this trio, along with last season's staff, Lou Warrick, Bud Tinning, Guy Bush, Charley Root and Pat Malone, will be able to stand off the opposition while Klein and his mates lead a heavy hitting assault.

Grimm, without hesitation, picks Klein, who hit .328 with the Phillies last year, as the most valuable player in the league. His one worry in the outfield seems to be that of picking the most powerful trio out of the five outfielders he has at his call.

Besides Klein, there is young George Stalback, Los Angeles youth who cost the Cubs \$70,000, and three returnees of last season, Kiki Cuyler, Riggs Stephenson and Floyd Herman.

The Cub infield also has young blood at its disposal. The starting quartet probably will be Woody English at third, Bill Jurges short, Bill Herman, second and Grimm at first.

Grimm likes young Angie Gahan, another former coast leaguer, and probably will keep him for utility work along with either Stanley Hack or Dolph Camilli.

Charles (Gabby) Hartnett, temporarily out because of a broken finger, will again be the mainstay of the catching staff with Henry Tate and Ernest Phelps the supporting cast.

Grimm does not feel that he is taking too much of a gamble on the array of youngsters in camp. He took the smallest team to Santa Catalina island in years for spring training in order that more time could be spent on the youngsters.

He believes they will pay big league dividends that much earlier, perhaps soon enough to win the pennant.

DOZEN GOLFERS AHEAD OF BOBBY
AUGUSTA, Ga., Mar. 26 (AP) — Now that it's all over and Bobby Jones Jr. knows what it feels like to come back and take it squarely on his golfing chin, the explanation is quite clear today why the renowned Georgian trailed an even dozen professionals in competition for the first time in his career, finishing ten strokes behind the winner, Horton Smith, in the \$3,000 first annual masters' invitation tournament.

Jones not only mislaid "Calamity Jane," the putter with which he stroked his way through the greatest golf championship winning streak of all time, but he lost his putting touch along with it and wound up in 13th place. Horton Smith won with a score of 284.

Far from being discouraged, Jones fully intends to make this spring joint with his old rivals an annual event. But that's the full extent to which he intends ever to return to competition.

NIGHT FOOTBALL NOVELTY LONDON HAD IT IN 1879
LONDON (AP) — Evidence has been brought forth to prove that rugby football was played in England by artificial light as far back as 1879.

In that year two teams met here at 8 o'clock in the evening, used a white ball and played a regulation game. Power for lighting was supplied by two electric dynamo batteries and a pair of 50-cell batteries. The experiment was written down as something of a failure, the light being too flimsy.

PLANE FOR SLIM PURSES LANDS AT 35-MILE SPEED
YOUNGSTOWN, O. (AP) — What is claimed to approach the government's ideal of an airplane fitting the ability and pocketbook of the "average citizen" is a new 500-pound model which a Youngstown factory expects to market.

Designers claim it will land at a speed as low as 36 miles an hour in still air and if facing a little wind at a speed not much faster than a man can run. Most larger planes require landing speeds from 40 to 75 miles an hour.

The plane carries a pilot and one passenger, has a top speed of 90 miles an hour, is powered with a 45 horsepower engine and gets approximately 35 miles to a gallon of gasoline.

'B' TOURNEY MAY BE PLAYED HERE IN 1935 SEASON

MAY HAVE "B" TOURNEY HERE

District tournaments for B class teams may be played next year in La Grande, Monmouth, Ashland and Forest Grove, it is indicated. Under the present plans the tournament here would be under the auspices of the Eastern Oregon Normal school, La Grande and Baker are the only present A class teams in district No. 1.

SALEM, Mar. 24 (AP) — Oregon high schools will be redistricted for state tournament play into A and B classes, 12 of the former and four of the latter, Paul T. Jackson, president of the State High School Athletic association announced today following a meeting of the board of control of the organization.

The purpose of redistricting the state is to afford more smaller schools opportunity to compete in the state tournament, Jackson said. The A schools will include all with an enrollment of 150 or over, while those under will be in the B class. The state will be divided into 12 districts for A teams and four for B teams.

A change will affect games preparatory to eligibility to the state tournament, but after arrival, the 16 teams will compete against each other in the same manner, Jackson said. The new system will go into effect for next year's play.

The action of the board followed recommendations of a special committee named at the annual meeting, comprised of H. J. Hendrickson, of Merrill; E. S. Schultz, of Perrydale, and O. F. Campbell, of Wallawa.

Jackson stated that smaller teams seldom reach the state tournament and the action was taken to encourage more smaller high schools and bring them to the tournament. The committee will continue at work drawing the lines for the new districts. The board will announce the new districts after it receives the committee recommendations.

CARDINALS LOOK FOR DEAN BOYS TO SCORE WINS

BRADENTON, Fla., Mar. 21 (AP) — The Dean boys of Oklahoma have done their best this spring to relieve Frank Frisch of worry about how far his pitching staff will carry the St. Louis Cardinals in this year's national league pennant race.

Frisch has some pretty fair flingers on his staff otherwise, including Wild Bill Hallahan, Jesse Haines, Tex Carleton, Bill Walker and the oblique Louis Burleigh, Grimes, but the boys, Dean, Dimey and Paul, have separately and collectively expressed an entire willingness to shoulder the main burden. Twenty victories apiece is the minimum they have set for 1934. In fact, Paul, the family's freshman who won 22 for Columbus last year, assured Branch Rickey he would turn in 25 triumphs just to prove he has more stuff than his brother.

Outside of their mound staff, the Cardinals have a number of star players but it is a question whether they have the right balance and enough batting punch. The trade of Jimmy Wilson to the Phillies for big Virgil Davis, who hit .349 last year, increases the batting power but Wilson's skillful backstopping will be missed.

Several new combinations have been tried and recruits tested, but the infield seems certain to start the season with Jim Collins at first, Manager Frisch in the keystone spot, Lou Dierker, baseball's premier "jockey" at short and the acrobatic Pepper Martin on third. The Cardinals who lost a great shortstop when Charley Gelbert filled a leg with buckshot, earnestly sought Dick Bartell of the Phillies, and still have hopes of adding strength to the infield. Burgess Whitehead, Columbus

recruit and "Pat" Crawford will be reserves.

Martin made the switch from the outfield to third base last season so successfully that baseball men consider him the defensive superior now of the great Pie Traynor, in addition to which Pepper's batting, base-running and aggressiveness mean much to the club's pennant chances. Martin led all the Cardinal regulars at bat last season with 316.

late Saturday afternoon, Mahoney, who had made an unexpected return from a campaign tour in the north, discharged the chief and suspended the two officers.

The day here was one of sensational political developments which have left both friends and enemies of Mahoney speculating on his next move.

The first definite hint of a political break came early Saturday afternoon when Percy Murray and W. D. Miller, business leaders, announced their withdrawals as officers of the Mahoney for Governor club. Both said business was too pressing to permit them to serve but it was generally believed they received an advance tip on the investigation.

Mahoney himself was summoned before the grand jury as a witness.
