

Eight Team Amateur Baseball League Organized

LA GRANDE WILL OPEN SEASON ON APR. 8 AT COVE

Baker, Halfway, Pondosa, Union, Pleasant Grove and Elgin Also Enter Clubs.

An eight-team, amateur baseball league, to be known as the Hine Mountain league, was organized here at a meeting last night, with Roy Farnam elected president and D. W. Hall elected secretary-treasurer. A fourteen-game schedule, beginning April 8 and ending July 8, was adopted.

La Grande, Baker, Halfway, Pondosa, Union, Cove, Pleasant Grove and Elgin entered teams. There were 12 applicants, four others withdrawing.

The first three games will see La Grande playing away from home because of the construction work at the L. H. S. field, but later in the season, several home games in a row are scheduled. The games April 8 follow: La Grande at Cove, Pondosa at Union, Baker at Halfway and Elgin at Pleasant Grove. The complete schedule will be announced soon.

It was emphasized that the league will be strictly amateur. No player will be paid, only home talent will be used, and the only thing to play for will be a championship cup to be put up by the Roy Farnam Supply Co. Each team will post a \$15 franchise fee by April 9 and this will be returned to each team intact at the close of the season except for necessary league expenses. The Wilson ball W-181 was selected as the official ball, and it was agreed each team will pay its own traveling expenses and keep its own umpire. Each team will furnish one umpire per game, the home umpire behind the plate and the visiting umpire on

base. La Grande's club expects to ask the business men for a small amount necessary to purchase needed equipment and carry the club financially over the first three weeks of the season, until home games can be played and some gate receipts realized. The team will hold a first workout at 5 o'clock this evening at Greenwood school, although players have been working out for weeks individually.

Burke Not To Run If Holman Enters Race

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Sam Brown, Marion county farmer and state senator, already is in the field as a "Progressive Republican." Meanwhile, leaders of the so-called "real Republicans" met here to see what can be done toward selecting a candidate and rallying support behind him, once he is selected.

Tom Elliott of Milton, Umatilla county, chairman of the state Republican committee, called the Portland session. He conferred with Ralph W. Williams, national committeeman; Floyd Cook, former state chairman; Willard Henderson, Multnomah county chairman, and Jack Day, recently retired from the United States marshalship.

There was no indication today of any choice for the Republican leadership. Willard Marks of Albany, regarded as the most outstanding potential candidate, refused to enter the race, and Earl Snell of Arlington, can not be persuaded to make the attempt. Leslie M. Scott, of Portland, highway commission chairman, is now being attended in the hope he may decide to seek the nomination as governor.

Snell, speaker of the house at the last state legislature, was in Salem today, looking over the situation with a view of making an announcement probably Thursday. Snell was considering whether or not to enter the race for secretary of state.

While here Snell conferred with others with P. J. Stadelman, secretary of state. When informed that Elbert Bode would not be a candidate for the office, he declared that Bode was right in stating that it would cost a lot of money and indicated that was the only reason for delaying his own announcement.

Walter M. Pierce, Democrat of La Grande and Harry M. Kenin, Republican of Portland, filed with the secretary of state today for the nomination for representative in congress from the second and third districts respectively.

Pierce, incumbent, seeks the reelection on a platform containing the statement that he will "support Roosevelt's courageous struggle for security of homes, farms and jobs." Pierce was the first to file from the second district, although Jay Upton, of Bend, late yesterday announced that he would be a candidate for the Republican nomination.

Miss Dodson rushed the boy to Hot Lake but his injuries were so serious his life could not be saved.
