U. P. Watchword For Train Safety First

capable of independent, safe operation in case of failure on the part of the other.

A newly developed appliance, called a decelerometer, has been perfected and is installed on this new train. Its function is to equalize the brake pressure on every wheel of the train, admit maximum brake pressure but prevent excessive braking and locked wheels such as is possible on motor cars by too much pressure on foot pedal or emergency brake. Another feature of the decelerometer is that it prevents the train from starting unless the braking system is in perfect order.

"Dead man" control is the term applied to the duplicate devices installed to require the engineer or operator to keep either a hand or foot on this control while the train is moving. If for any reason hand or foot is removed from this control while the train is in motion, there is an immediate automatic closing of the throttle and application of the brakes.

formation in charge of W. Averell Harriman, a youthful special assistant. He is the son of E. H. Harriman, the railroad magnate, and is himself an industrialist of wide responsibilities. He is one of the newcomers to NRA.

The biggest change ordered was the creation of a litigation division to handle all court cases in the name of the department of justice.

This was aimed at more speedy disposition of cases, not possible at the justice department because of a limited staff. The new division will be under the legal department headed by Donald R. Richberg, one-time railroad labor spokesman, who is Johnson's general counsel.

All the other alterations likewise were drafted for greater speed, to cut off the protests from industrial groups which cannot get policies settled and complaints quickly attended to.

The reorganization made all deputy administrators responsible for quick disposal of all non-enforcement complaints on codes under their jurisdiction.

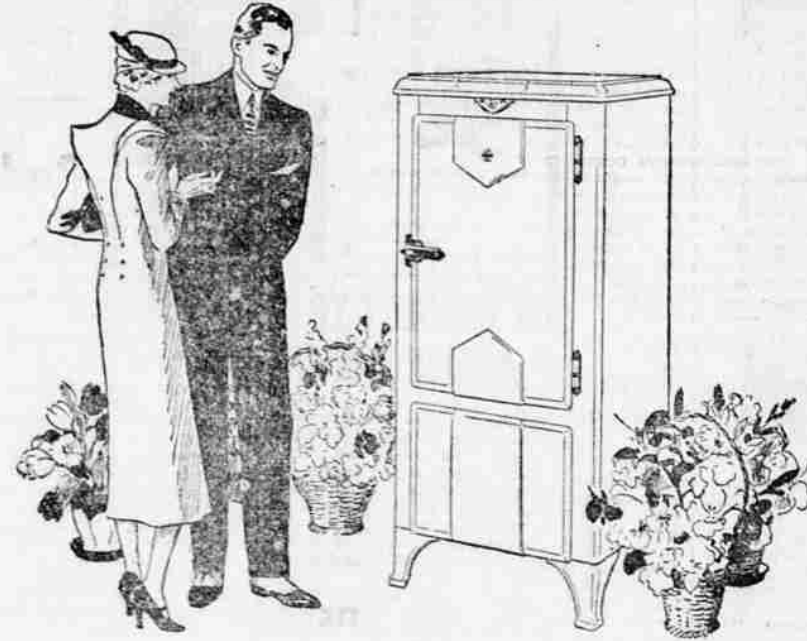
