(Continued From Page One) On March 5, a gain of nearly \$60,000. And deposits, at \$747,740.87 on Dec. 31, have increased to \$794,510.05 this month, a gain of more than \$46,000. All three of these items reflects a general betterment of the bank's condition here, and at the same time is indicative of increased economic gains in the community. With the certificates of deposits paid up, officers of the bank indicated that there might be expected a slow but steady increase in the loan structure, with additional credit allowances from time to time in the case of first class security — an increase that will allow continuance of the bank's strong liquid position. In the bank's report, another resource showing a gain is that of bonds and securities, exclusive of U. S. bonds, which has increased nearly \$5,000 from \$85,540.79 in Dec. 31 to \$89,905.93 on March 5.
