PRICE OF BUTTER, BUTTERFAT DROPS

PORTLAND, Mar. 28 (AP)—Drop of 1/4 to 1/2 lb. in the price of cube butter during a special session of the produce exchange was not unexpected, as a result of increased churning operations. Increasing surplus was suggested all through this territory with demand showing only for most immediate requirements. Buyers as a rule were not expecting anything but lower prices with the advance of the season.

The new quotations again placed a small premium on extra grade at 21 1/2c while standard and prime first were 21c and first 20c pound.

The cutting of butter prices resulted in a reduction of 1c in the buying price on butterfat here.

tion enthusiast, in a talk this noon before members of the La Grande Rotary club.

"Progress in aviation is known to every individual who can read and see but the rapidity of that progress and the complete change in our method of transportation which that progress without doubt portends for the very near future, is not generally realized," said Mr. Moore.

"There is little doubt that in space of a few years, perhaps less than that we will be traveling by air, with perfect confidence, on either short or long trips. Transcontinental air lines with limited stops will continue as is, but in between points, will be what are already being considered as 'pick-up' ships that will make stops and take on and let off passengers or express and make connections with the transcontinental planes."

"It behooves La Grande, let us say for emergency sake of its real future development and progress, to encourage and see definitely established here in this valley an airport such as will meet and attract the requirements of air transportation of the very near future. Pendleton has made a very forward step in this regard with its commercial airport to be ready for opening next month. By its action, that neighbor city becomes a regular stop in the transcontinental line of the great United Air Lines system. A tremendous step in the assured future forward progress of that city."

attention to national affairs before starting out. After one of his busiest days yesterday, he set aside his time upon leaving Washington last night entirely to vacation freedom.

Mr. Roosevelt's jaw stuck out when mention was made of the house vote over-riding his veto of the veterans pay bill, but he declined any comment upon it.

Reaching Jacksonville at 9:30 this morning the president drove through cheering lanes of citizens over the five mile route from the station to the dock.

The destroyer U. S. S. Ellis, under command of Captain White, picked up the trail behind the trim Nourmahal and in a few minutes the president was out of sight of the dock on his long-planned vacation cruise.

Gus Genenrich, personal bodyguard, and Robert Clark of the secret service, were the only ones associated with the president at the White House aboard ship with him.
