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Added Jobs In Sight Soon In Eastern Oregon

Guy V. Lintner, federal re-employment director in Oregon, met with the Union county committee here last night, of which R. J. Kitchen is chairman. He explained the work of the organization in the state, stating that plans were to make it permanent and conduct it under the highest and most efficient standards so as to afford aid both to public and private projects in obtaining workmen.

At present, he said, it costs 84 cents a year per man, with the cost borne partly by the state and partly by the government. He compared this with much higher costs of private employment agencies.

PLANE TRAIN TO BE IN ROPED OFF AREA

The showing in La Grande of the Union Pacific streamline train, also known as the "bullet" train and the plane train, will take place in a roped off area north of the U. P. depot, it was announced today.

The train itself is to be roped off with only one entrance—north of the depot—and one exit, onto Fourth street. Jefferson street is to be roped off at Fourth and Chestnut, and the alley back of the Foley building between Adams and Jefferson also will be roped off, with no cars to be allowed in this restricted zone, state and city police said.

A unanimous request from the 70 women present that the Home-makers conference for Union county be made an annual affair and included in a program with a group of other counties not having the services of a home demonstration agent, concluded the one-day conference held yesterday at the Island City church under the direction of three members of the extension staff of the State college.

In spite of the fact that yesterday's meeting was the first of the kind held in the county and that there was little more than a week for preparation and arrangements, the project was deemed a decided success by those in charge and considered of exceptional benefit and importance by those who attended. It is stated. Not the least important fact was that the attendance was representative—women being present from the Union, Cove, La Grande, Summerville, Allice, Pleasant Grove, Imbler, Elgin, Island City and Crickets Flat communities.

SENATE LEADERS BELIEVE BONUS HAS NO CHANCE

TO GET CHECKS MAY 1
WASHINGTON, March 30 (AP)—War veterans benefiting from the independent offices bill will receive their government checks May 1 and government employees will get their pay increases by April 14. The veterans' administration today continued study of the bill, passed over President Roosevelt's veto.

WASHINGTON, March 30 (AP)—Senate administration leaders think privately that the \$2,000,000,000 "greenback-bonus" bill has little chance of becoming law this session. The house has approved the measure, and it now is in the senate finance committee. Chairman Harrison (D-Miss.) indicated today there would be no rush by his committee even to consider the bill. Senator Harrison was one of those who stood with the president on the veterans' bill veto earlier this week.

One Democratic leader pointed out that the senate has twice voted "no" on the bonus this session, and he believes it would do so again. Even should the bill be passed, he is of the opinion that insufficient votes could be mustered to override the presidential veto that would be certain.

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Carrot Tries To Outdo Easter Egg

ROAD WORK WILL FINISH IN MAY

ENTERPRISE, Ore., (Special)—With a large crew of men working, the grade on the forest section of the Sheep creek road will be finished by the first of May, it is expected. The Colonial Construction company, with C. A. Ludberg in charge, has the contract and has been employing about 75 men on the job. This section of road is about eight miles in length, extending from the Bridge up Sheep creek. It will not be surfaced at present.

Between the upper end of this forest section and the graded portion of the state section there is a gap of seven miles where no work has been done. The road has been designated as a secondary state highway and the state is obligated to complete it.

WALLACE IS HINTED AT IN WIRT WIRE

Gary Man, However, Refuses to Engage in Debate With Rep. Foulkes

WASHINGTON, Mar. 30 (AP)—Representative Foulkes, (D. Mich.) disclosed today that Dr. William A. Wirt of Gary, Ind., had declined a challenge to debate with him upon the latter's allegations that some Roosevelt advisers are communistic sympathizers.

The Wirt telegram as made public by the congressman read: "Secretary Wallace recently published the statement 'there can hardly be even a satisfactory tentative answer until we decide which way we want to go.' It should be debated in congress, in public forums in city and in country schoolhouse meetings in every state. The people must be let in on the problem."

"The question is not a manhunt for a communist. I congratulate you on your offer to assist in this effort to decide the way we want to go. I sincerely regret that, owing to the limitations of time and physical strength, I can not assist you."

Foulkes said: "He (Dr. Wirt) quotes Secretary Wallace as well as some others to the effect that brain trusters had not decided yet which way the country was going."

Today, Foulkes declined to express himself on the "significance" of the message from Wirt.

The Michigan congressman's statement added, however: "Apparently Dr. Wirt came in like a lion and is going out like a lamb."

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REDUCE OREGON LIQUOR PRICES

PORTLAND, March 30 (AP)—The Oregon liquor control commission today announced that a downward revision in liquor prices in all state stores and agencies will become effective Monday.

Straight whiskies have been reduced 25 cents a pint, and some will be as low as \$1.19 a pint. Bonded American whiskies will remain unchanged.

George L. Sammis, control board administrator, said prices in Oregon are not due to go much lower until a comparison of Washington state liquor store prices with the new Oregon schedule shows the Washington prices on higher grade liquor to be considerably lower, although prices are higher on liquor of less quality.

UNION COUNTY IS FIRST TO SIGN UP

The state board of review is not ready yet to work on individual counties regarding the hog-corn control set-up. County Agent H. O. PETERSBURG, Ind., Mar. 30 (AP)—Ward Davis, 20-year-old former high school athlete, was held for safe keeping in a nearby county today while officers sought the reason for the slaying of the girl he started to escort to a junior class party last night.

The body of Annabelle France, 16, a bullet in her heart, was found in an automobile in front of Davis' home by his father last night, a few hours after she told a friend she feared "something desperate" might happen.

Happy chatter of fellow students awaiting the girl's arrival at the high school party was stilled suddenly by a telephone call announcing her death.

Davis, a few minutes earlier, had surrendered to authorities. Officers said he made no statement. When a crowd began to form about the jail, however, state police spirited the youth away.

HITLER HOPEFUL OF TALK WITH PRESIDENT

BERLIN, Mar. 30—Chancellor Adolf Hitler told me today that he wished he might have man-to-man talks with the leaders of other nations—including President Roosevelt.

By such personal conversations, he said, the pitfalls of diplomacy might be avoided.

"The antiquated diplomatic method of exchanging notes," he said, "finds a telling condemnation in the fact that, despite the efforts of diplomats, the nations in 1914 slipped into the most gigantic war in history, although I am convinced the diplomats themselves were the most surprised

COURTS MAY RETURN HIM TO AMERICA

Turkish Tribunal Will Make Decision, Government Announces

SHIP REMAINS IN ISTANBUL HARBOR

American Ambassador's Request to Turks to Seize Insull Results in Quick Action.

ISTANBUL, Turkey, Mar. 30 (AP)—A reliable source revealed tonight that the Turkish government probably will hand Samuel Insull over to American authorities following the formality of a hearing in the penal court tomorrow.

ISTANBUL, Mar. 30 (AP)—A Turkish court will decide whether Samuel Insull must return to the United States as a prisoner, the government announced today. It was decided to put the question of arrest of the fugitive, now aboard the steamer Maflets here, up to a competent court, probably the penal court of Istanbul.

The government's decision was made on the basis of the provisions of the penal code, the ninth article of which gives Turkey the complete right to hand Insull over to American authorities without an extradition treaty.

Up to the present time the national assembly has not ratified the extradition treaty which was signed in 1923. The assembly, however, has been called for tomorrow, presumably, to discuss ratification of the treaty.

Insull Virtual Prisoner

Insull was finally collared after a long and exciting chase by the United States government when the steel arm of the strong Kemalist regime blocked the passage of his floating haven opposite the mouth of the famous Golden Horn and held the lone passenger of the Maflets a virtual prisoner while a full inquiry into his status was made.

Before the decision was made to place the question of arrest before the courts, the government indicated that it was awaiting documents from Washington before taking any action.

American Ambassador Skinner asked Turkey to seize the 74-year-old man, after receiving instructions from Washington, and the ambassador was told to produce the necessary papers so that officials here might act.

G. E. Co. Raises Pay of Employees Effective Apr. 1

NEW YORK, Mar. 30 (AP)—Gerard Swope, president of the General Electric company, announced today that, effective April 1, all full-time salaries of \$2,000 or less and all hourly rates of pay will be increased ten per cent. Between 30,000 and 40,000 employees will benefit and the extra pay will total between \$3,500,000 and \$4,000,000 annually.

2 Killed, 21 Injured In Big Hotel Fire

LONGVIEW, Tex., Mar. 30 (AP)—At least two persons were killed and 21 injured, 11 of them seriously here early today when fire razed the \$250,000 Longview hotel.

D. F. Stafford, Dallas, was killed when he jumped from a third floor window and struck the pavement head first. Search of the ruins resulted in the discovery of a charred body.

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
