California Professor Presents Picture of Composite Perfect Teacher

INSTRUCTORS ARE CARRYING BURDEN

So Says C. A. Howard, State Superintendent, in Discussion of Financial Conditions Today

More than 300 superintendents, principals and teachers of Eastern Oregon gathered for the annual meeting of the association this morning at which Dr. Frank W. Hart, of the University of California, was the principal speaker. A. L. Gralapp, principal of the La Grande High school, president of the association, presided over the session of which Miss Kate Houck, director of training at the J. H. Ackerman Training school, is secretary. "What High School Seniors Think of Teachers They Have Had," the result of a survey of questionnaires submitted to 10,000 high school seniors throughout the country, was the theme of Dr. Hart's address. From the inquiries as to "the teacher liked best and why," "the teacher liked least and why," and "how many teachers are more like the first and how many are more like the second," Dr. Hart drew a picture of the composite perfect teacher and the worst. Eighty per cent of the teachers which were liked best were also the best teachers for their understanding, fairness,

BAKER, Mar. 31 (AP)—I. B. Bowen Sr., 75, who retired in 1928 as editor of the old Morning Democrat after 41 years of service with one of the oldest newspapers in Oregon, died this morning about 9 o'clock from the effects of injuries sustained when struck by an automobile on Main street Wednesday night. Mr. Bowen, who was born in Oak Park, Cook county, Ill., Nov. 28, 1858, came to Baker county in 1902 with his parents, who were among the first

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ARMY MAIL FLIER KILLED IN IOWA

DEWITT, Iowa, Mar. 31 (AP)—Blindling rain and a perilously low ceiling sent Lt. Thomas A. Woods, army mail flier, hurtling to death on a farm near here, authorities said today. He was the 12th army flier to die since the fighting airmen received the order to carry the mails. His death was the first since the recent resumption of army mail carrying. Of the 12 who were killed since the contracts of private concerns were cancelled on charges of collusion, five were flying mail at the time.

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SAM INSULL REFUSES TO LEAVE BOAT

Man Wanted by U. S. Clings to Hope of Greek Protection

TURKISH ARREST ORDER IS GIVEN

Case May Result in Turko-Greek Controversy, But Officials Expect Amicable Settlement

WASHINGTON, Mar. 31 (AP)—The United States took today the last necessary step to secure Samuel Insull, immediate formal arrest in Istanbul by Turkish police. Ambassador Robert P. Skinner received a certified copy of the Insull indictment at 8 a. m., cabled to Ankara from Athens.

ISTANBUL, Mar. 31 (AP)—Turkey today ordered the arrest of Samuel Insull, but the 74-year-old Chicago fugitive flatly refused a police request that he quit his floating haven, the tramp steamer Malotis which flies the flag of Greece.

It was Greece which gave him a year and a half asylum from United States authorities who seek to try him on charges of grand larceny and embezzlement growing out of the collapse of his Mid-West Utilities companies. The Turkish order followed a request by the United States government that Insull be arrested, but Insull, apparently, clung to the hope that the Greek flag would continue to give him protection.

Complications in Turko-Greek relations as a result of the incident were feared in some quarters, for Capt. Ioannis Mousouris, the master of the Malotis, protested to the detention of his vessel in the Straits of the Bosphorus, a "free" passage similar, according to law, to the Danube.

It was even predicted that the Greek government might send a note to the Turkish government on the subject. "The Turkish police requested" Insull to disembark and remain in either a hotel or hospital pending decision in his case.

Diplomatic circles were of the opinion that the question between Greece and Turkey would be settled amicably. Captain Mousouris said the police had asked to put an agent in Insull's cabin in order to prevent him from committing any desperate act but that this request had been refused although a police agent stayed continually on guard in the corridor

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Lenten Season Comes to Close Over the World

ROME, Mar. 31 (AP)—Paschal candles were lighted in nearly 500 churches and basilicas this morning as priests and laymen alike celebrated Holy Saturday. Church bells silent since Holy Thursday rang out, sacred images solemnly draped in commemoration of Christ's passion and death were uncovered, and joyful organ music once again was allowed to resound through the churches.

The ceremonies marked the end of the 40-day Lenten mourning. Today's services had a note of joyful anticipation for tomorrow's anniversary of Christ's resurrection.

NO CHRISTIAN NAME FOR THE EASTER

No distinctively Christian name exists for the resurrection festival, Easter Sunday, which will be observed the world over, tomorrow, authorities state.

Easter is the appellation given, with some small variation in the several languages and dialects, by the nations of Teutonic descent, to the festival kept in commemoration of the Saviour's resurrection.

The Latin nations called the same feast by words derived from

Latin Pascha, Greek Pascha, and remotely from the Hebrew Pasch, meaning the Passover, whence the French Pâque, in Spanish Pascua, in Portuguese Páscoa, and in Italian Pasqua. From the same source also, the word Pascha has been introduced into Anglo-Saxon.

Thus no distinctively Christian name—one of the two being of ethnic and the other of Jewish origin.
