STATE TO MAKE LIQUOR

A CHANGING ATTITUDE

After a session of seemingly being lulled to sleep with the rhythm of a one-man band, congress awoke this week with a start. Passage of the veterans' and federal employees' legislation over President Roosevelt's veto gives evidence that in the future members of our two principal law-making bodies are going to take more into their own hands the responsibilities of their offices.

This bolting of the traces after a long period of submission to the desires of the chief executive is, in our humble estimation, far from being the last contrariness that F. R. will find displayed by the congressional team he has been so successful in holding in line up to date.

Many congressional members, particularly those of the house who must face the polls this season before being insured of a return to their old desks at Washington, have been hearing lately a bit of words from home. And those words have not all been complimentary.

Surprising, too, to those under the Bourbon banner must be the fact that a growing amount of these murmurings of displeasure at their seeming submission to a one-man government, come from a home constituency pledged with them less than two years ago to the same faith.

Realization is slowly coming to those in congress that a growing percentage of the American public and voters of both parties during the past year is gradually changing its viewpoint. Though still holding the greatest respect for its president and with a full confidence and desire of support in that he is sincerely doing his best as he sees it to make conditions better, this growing list of American public is far from convinced as yet that a paternalistic government is to be desired.

That those forces which have made America great—initiative, self-reliance and independence—are not to be so easily stamped out of our lives. That we are not yet desirous of accepting without further contradiction a program, inviting as it may on the surface appear, that substitutes theories in place of principles established by our forefathers. Principles under which we have operated so successfully over many experienced years of progress and expansion.

Merchants have donated frequently to benefit campaigns of which they knew nothing, yet they had within their grasp one quick and sure way to learn whether the solicitation was worthy.

We refer to the Better Business Bureau of the La Grande Chamber of Commerce, conducted for the self protection of members and of others who reside in this community. It's very simple—just ask the solicitor if he has a Better Business Bureau card before you contribute. If he has, you can rest assured he is worthy of your attention; if he has no such card, there is reason for doubt. Demand to see the bureau card would not discriminate against the worthy cause, yet they would serve to drive out those who have no right to display it.

UTILIZE PROTECTION

In recent weeks numerous solicitations of funds for various purposes have been conducted in La Grande, as well as other cities, and much of these canvasses have been for the aid of some out-of-town group or activity. And they have been quite successful, taking considerable sums of money out of La Grande—money which probably could be spent to much better advantage in solving our own problems of helping the needy.
