## C. W. A. COMES TO END—GOOD DONE HOPKINS STATES

WASHINGTON, Mar. 31 (AP)—The civil works administration has come to an end with the man in charge—Harry L. Hopkins—pronouncing it a success.

"It resulted in work of social usefulness that will be a benefit in years to come," the CWA administrator told reporters, adding the program gave "millions of people an opportunity to earn an income on a real job."

Approximately 1,850,000 persons still are on the payroll, but most of them are to be transferred Monday to the work program of the relief administration—also headed by Hopkins.

The administration has spent approximately \$1,000,000,000 on civil works, Hopkins said. Of this, \$750,000,000 went for payrolls and approximately \$250,000,000 for materials. Some of the money was supplied by states, counties and municipalities.

The average employment by civil works from December 1 to date was given as 3,000,000.

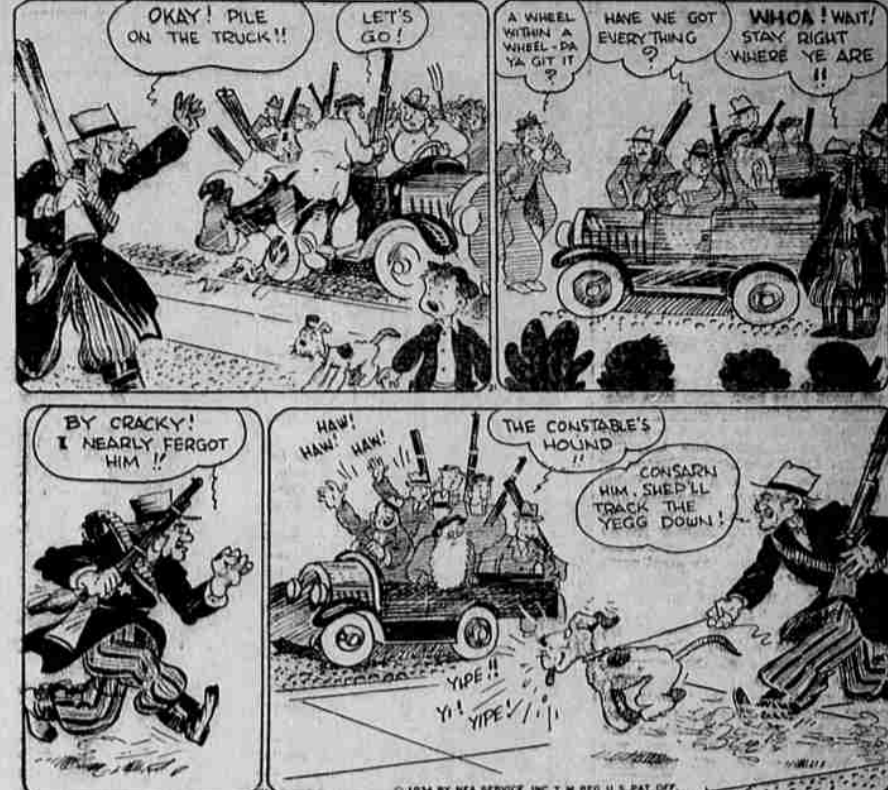
