

LAND BANK LOANS WILL BE MADE IN NEW U. S. BONDS

Chas. H. Reynolds, secretary-treasurer of the Grande Ronde National Farm Loan association, has received word from Wm. I. Myers, governor of the farm credit administration, Washington, D. C., that federal land bank loans and land bank commissioner's loans will be made in the future through the federal land bank in bonds of the Federal Farm Mortgage corporation, which bonds are guaranteed by the United States government both as to principal and interest, which will be at the rate of 3 1/2 per cent per annum. These bonds will take the place of the cash distribution in the disbursement of the unclosed loans previously approved by the federal land bank.

The plan has been made effective for all disbursements in the nationwide land bank system. Insurance of \$2,000,000,000 of the federal farm mortgage corporation bonds was authorized by the law passed by congress in January.

More than 18,070 loans, totaling about \$40,000,000, which already have been approved in Oregon, Washington, Montana and Idaho, will be affected by the order.

Bond disbursements, Mr. Reynolds said, will replace cash except in amounts less than \$100, the smallest denomination to be issued. The bonds will mature March 15, 1964, and will be callable after ten years.

Governor Myers assured Secretary Reynolds that the Federal Farm Mortgage corporation bonds will be an attractive investment. "They will be as readily marketable as bonds of the United States government, and they will be quoted in all of the principal markets," he continued. "Holders who have to dispose of these bonds should not sell them without first ascertaining their real market value."

Loans in the Pacific northwest states include first mortgage land bank loans and emergency refinancing land bank commissioner's loans for which the bank acts as the commissioner's agent in receiving applications and making loans.

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businessmen in all lines of endeavor in both small communities and large metropolitan centers.

"From the merchant and manufacturer in the smaller communities to the heads of great industrial plants in the larger cities, there is a general feeling that we are well on the upstroke in this country and depression passed," said Mr. Haught. "Factories everywhere are gradually resuming operations and in some lines putting larger crews to work. The automobile manufacturers say they cannot keep up with demand. Steel mill operations are reopening and planning to start operation of more and more of their furnaces. The smaller community businessmen everywhere is enjoying improved business and trade. Everywhere, more people are gradually going back to work."

Speaking of the train Mr. Haught said it was the purpose in its operation to cut off at least a day's travel between the Pacific Coast and Chicago. He said, with the operation of at least three trans-continental trains in full swing by early fall, a businessman may be able to leave Portland one night and arrive in Chicago the second morning, or a through trip of two nights and a day. The present fastest trip is now three nights and two days or two nights and three days. Trains with six and nine cars, including sleeping car coaches, will be completed this July and ready for service shortly after, he said.
