### FOR LABOR'S OWN PROTECTION

It is often said that public office is a public trust. The same thing applies to the job of representing organized workmen. The man who has such a position not only speaks for the legitimate aspirations of his fellow workers; he also occupies an exceedingly important position, particularly these days, in the industrial setup of the country as a whole. And this position evidently is going to be more important in the future than in the past.

Organized labor, unless all signs fail, is about to be given more power than it ever has had before. It has a new Magna Charter in the making. What is it going to do with it?

It is not exactly a secret that there have been cases in the past where labor unions have been turned into unscrupulous rackets by officials or designing men more interested in lining their own pockets than in advancing the cause of the men they were supposed to represent. Individual greed, stupidity and selfishness have in some instances given both employers and employees reason to distrust the labor organizer. Such practices do more to retard the cause of labor than all the hardbodies and greedy employers in the country.

The intelligent and honorable labor leader — and there are many such — can do a great work in the times just ahead of us. Working people, whether members of the American Federation of Labor, or of other unions, should receive fair wages, shorter work hours, old age pensions and even non-employment insurance from industry. That is the ultimate goal and hope of all fair minded businessmen.

But this goal cannot be reached until industry itself has gotten back on its feet. True, business is better, but until industry has had a chance to get rid of its indebtedness or it can be definitely determined that improvement has arrived for a real period of time to come, it is to be hoped that labor will not allow itself to be dragged into a conflict of strikes such as appear imminent in some sections.

Respecting the new and better program of things for the working man to go immediately into effect before industry has had opportunity to adjust itself and threatening strikes which improvements are made right now, is the wrong attitude to be taken at this seeming turning point in our general economic structure. At the same time the beginning of the depression could be a strike involving hundreds of thousands of working men to be so desperately needed as at this hour. It would come just as recovery has begun to proceed with some certainty and fair earnings. Such strikes would be fatal now not only to the buying power and the security of thousands of workers, but to spirit destroy the well being of families, women and children dependent upon them as well as work destruction in all parts of allied industries.

Paul Block, nationally known publisher of a string of large metropolitan papers, in a recent editorial in his various publications says concerning labor — "That liberty and right must not be washed and public opinion, which in the long run will always support what is just, will not countenance any selfish advantage which either industry or labor may desire to dictate. The whole country demands economic peace. We have gone through so many years of turmoil and struggle that unjust terms imposed by either side will not be tolerated by the public."

Opportunity is at hand for labor but it is labor and its unions are to get the new rights to which they are entitled, it must recognize the responsibilities that are to go with them. Labor cannot, in these days, afford to carry within its ranks the member, the well-wisher, the outsider, the man or organizer who under false flag to his own comrades plays a trick which against the middle for the sake of his own advantage. Now is the time, it goes before the labor in all its branches to consider and determine most carefully the real character, aims and purposes of its leadership.

Oregon, on blood stains found in the wrecked home where Francis Funder, his wife and four guests were believed and shot to death last Thursday night. Valuable diamond rings were missing after the crime.

One of the slayers was undoubtedly seriously wounded in the shooting. Mr. and Mrs. Funder, blood stains, and determining that some of them came from a person other than the six victims. Medical attention would probably soon have been needed. Therefore, on such a belief, Sheriff E. L. Minton called today for physicians in their offices here, at Seattle, and at other Western Washington centers to report their attendance on any person with unexplained wounds. Photographs found in the home, he said, would soon identify them.

Meanwhile the Kitsap county commissioners had a \$500 reward posted, and have voted \$1,500 for investigation expenses.  
A close search at length yesterday, a blood-splattered coat turned in to a tailor's here on Saturday, was discovered that night when its owner, a navy yard worker, was discovered, and he explained he had been in a bad fight.
