Substandard Workers May Be Given Certificates By Charles H. Gram

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — Substandard workers under the federal reemployment agreement and NRA codes, may be issued certificates to work by Charles H. Gram, state labor commissioner, he announced here today. Gram has been appointed by the U. S. department of labor to issue such certificates in order to care for workers who because of old age, physical or mental defects or injuries are unable to work as fast or efficiently as other employees.

Under the rules, Gram said, the employer desiring to retain in his employ a substandard worker must address a letter to the labor commissioner in Salem, requesting an application blank for substandard workers. This application must be filled in and signed by the employer and must also be signed by the employee, and accompanied by a doctor's certificate if the employee is either mentally or physically handicapped.

When this application, properly filled out, reaches the office of the labor commissioner, an investigation will be made and the application either allowed or rejected. All applications for substandard workers must be filed with the labor commissioner before May 1.

Upon filing this application with the commissioner, an employer may continue to employ a substandard worker already on his payroll and already employed in accordance with the specified provisions of the code at less than the minimum wage allowed by the code until such time

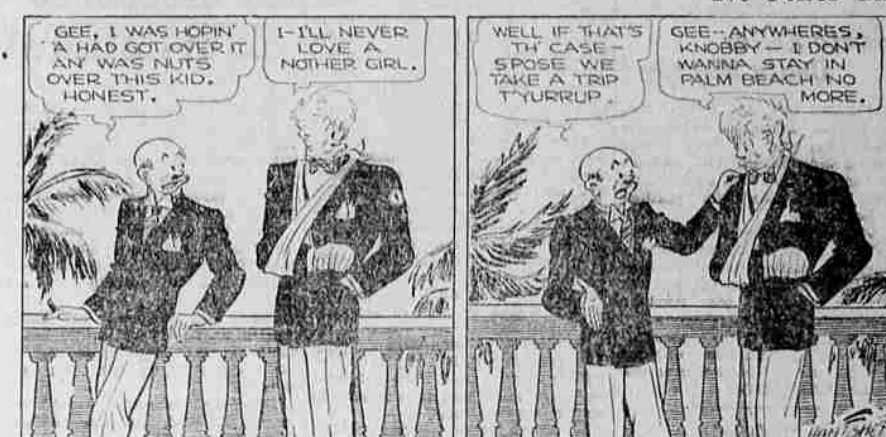

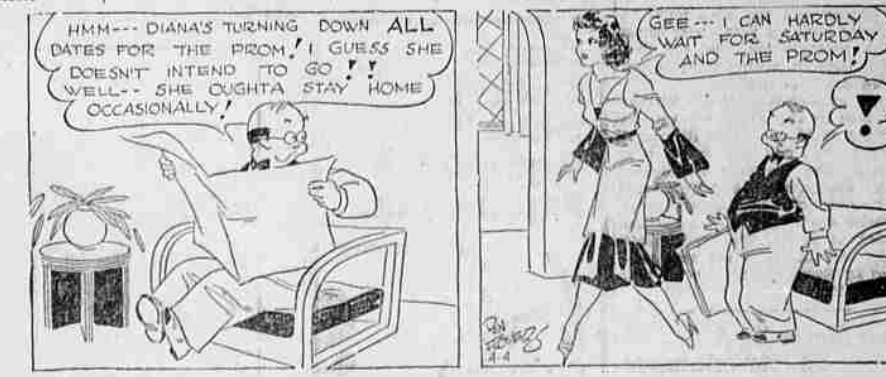

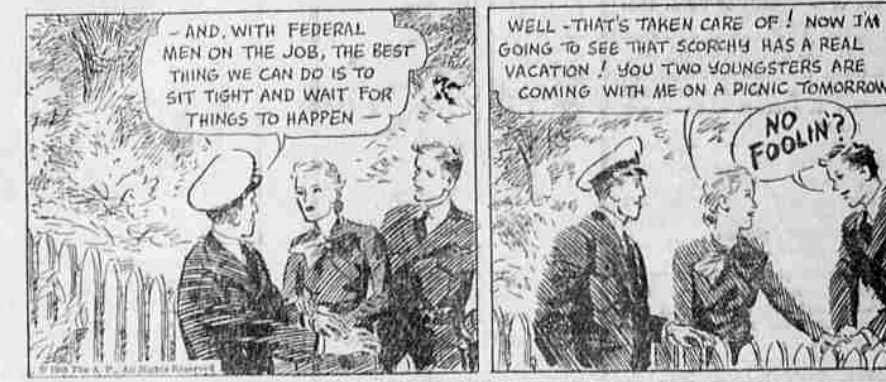
