 Generally picked as the club to beat in the 1934 Coast league pennant race, Los Angeles today was the only undefeated team in the circuit as the season entered its third day. Although home runs were plentiful throughout the league, fewer hits and fewer errors showed tighter baseball after a loosely played opening day.

It was on an error that the Angels scored a tenth inning run to defeat the Portland Ducks, 5 to 4, after Ed Bryan, Beaver pitcher, had hit a homer in the ninth inning to tie the score. In the last half of the tenth Dittmar grounded to third, Shesly, Beaver catcher, let English's throw roll through him and Demaree scored the winning run. All four of Port-

land's runs resulted from homers, Blackberry and Cox each connecting in the seventh, the latter with one on base.

After bowing to Seattle in the opening day's upset, the San Francisco Seals came back yesterday to defeat the Indians 7 to 3. A third inning rally in which the Seals scored five runs proved Seattle's downfall. A circuit clot in the ninth inning gave Oakland a 5 to 4 victory over Hollywood. The Stars were leading 4 to 3 when Jack Jackuki, Polish recruit from Honolulu, was sent in as a pinch hitter and rapped out a homer, bringing in two men before him.

Another home run was responsible for Sacramento's 3 to 2 win over the San Francisco Mission. Leo Osterberg lifted one over the fence in the eighth inning with two on base.

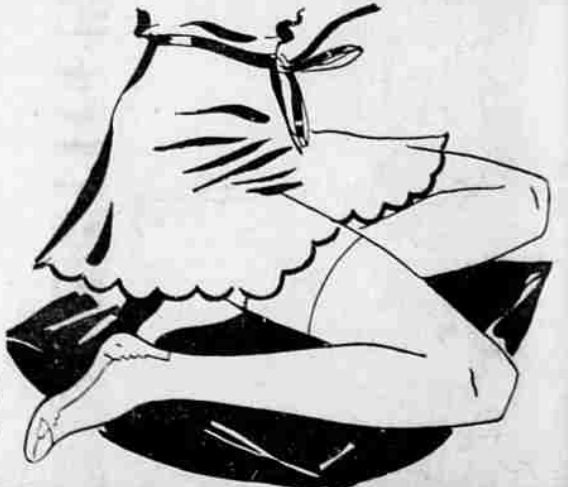
