Frank Shellenback today holds a new individual pitching record for the Pacific coast league by reason of Hollywood's 6 to 3 win over Oakland yesterday. The game brought Shellenback's string of victories in 14 years to 262, one more than the old established record by Charles "Spider" Baum when he was with the Seals. Baum, like Shellenback a spitballer, is now secretary of the Hollywood club.

Los Angeles continued at the top of the league, handing Portland its third straight defeat, 7 to 6. A nine inning early rally by the Beavers fell short with the tying run on third base. Both teams were held scoreless until the sixth inning. Home runs by Right Fielder Frank Demaree and Catcher Gilly Campbell contributed to the Angels' victory.

San Francisco's Seals smothered the Seattle Indians with a first-inning batting rampage which netted their six runs and drove Henry Ulrich from the box. The Seals chalked up a final score of 9 to 1 behind the light pitching of Win Ballou, who allowed only four bingles, while his teammates were collecting 14.

The Sacramento Senators did it two straight over the San Francisco Missions, winning 4 to 3. Samuel Salvo, moundman for the Senators, allowed only 7 hits, Dahlgren, Missions first baseman, lifted a homer with one on in the sixth.

The Hollywood Stars were a run behind when they launched an eighth-inning rally that netted them four runs.

vey also showed production 58 per cent higher and shipments 23 per cent heavier than for the first quarter last year.

The interstate commerce commission today reported 998,912 men working on class 1 steam railroads on March 15.

The figure was an increase of 8.58 per cent compared with March, 1933, when 919,881 men were employed, but still is below the 1933 peak reached last September when 1,030,215 persons were on the payroll.

New business totaling 47,465,000 feet, about 10 per cent above the three-year weekly average for March, but one per cent under the total for the previous week, was reported by the Western Pine association in Portland today for the week ending Mar. 31.

Shipments for the week were 48,405,000 feet, and production, 39,941,000 feet, an increase in production of 1,313,000 feet.
