**First Presbyterian Church**  
(Sixth and Washington)  
The church is a part of community life. The Sunday program is arranged for the uplift of society in the community. **First Church of Christ, Scientist**  
(First and Washington)

Among the citations which comprise the lesson-sermon was the following from the Bible: "Fear thou not for I am with thee. . . . yes, I will uphold thee with the right hand of my righteousness. Rebuke all they that were increased against thee shall be ashamed and confounded. They shall be as nothing; and they that strive with thee shall perish" (Isa. 41:10, 11).

The lesson-sermon also includes the following exhortative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Fear, which is an element of all disease, must be cast out to resign the balance for God. Casting out evil and fear enables truth to out-weigh error. The only course is to take antagonistic grounds against all that is opposed to the health, holiness, and harmony of man, God's image. Stand poster at the door of thought. Admitting only such confessions as you wish realized in bodily results, you will control yourself harmoniously" (p. 392).

Those art the Christ, the son of the living God, Matt. 16:16.

If one believes that the Word is like any other book, man-made, and not inspired, most likely he would see only that for which he looked. Different it would be with him who believed it inspired, and read it as God speaking to him. He would find it searching, enlightening, powerful and comforting.

If one thinks of Jesus as an ordinary man, he cannot accept the Word. He must explain away Jesus' claim, to converse with God. His deity, the miracles. His claim to universal power.

"I and the Father are one." "He that hath seen me hath seen the Father." "No man cometh unto the Father but by me," said Jesus. Herein is expressed a practical truth, for who has any other idea of God than as a diffused ether, if the Person of God is not seen in the Christ?

Seeing God in Jesus brings Him near. We know Him as the God-Man of infinite tenderness and love, as the heavenly Father whom we can love in return and fully trust. No longer does the feeling come that God is resentful, wrathful, cold and stern. We think of Him as the tender, sympathizing, helpful Jesus, who came to give inexpressible joy and peace. God comes and abides when the eyes are opened and we see Him in Jesus.

And then the resurrection scene! Death swallowed up in everlasting life, the assurance that because Jesus lived, we shall live also; the calm confidence in the knowledge that Jesus Christ reigneth! The resurrection light penetrates everywhere. Through Jesus as the Son of the living God, breaks the illuminating power.

## Collins Is Not Alarmed About Grove's Bad Arm

BOSTON, Apr. 6 (AP)—Eddie Collins, Boston Red Sox general manager, today refused to become alarmed about the reported flareup of Bob "Lefty" Grove over his \$100,000 outpunch pitching arm.

"When two such capable trainers as our Doc Woods and the Athletics' Doc Ebling, without having talked to each other, coincide in their diagnosis of Grove's sore arm, I am convinced it will right itself in time," Collins said.

"We have no intention of trying to call off our deal with Connie Mack. It was made in good faith and it is merely one of the breaks of the game that Grove should have contracted a cold or injured his shoulder muscles in some way."

Grove, according to reports from Orlando, Fla., suddenly threw down his glove Wednesday while warming up with Coach Tom Daly. He had been cutting loose and became so excited when his arm twined that he cried out, "to hell with it. I guess I can't do the club any good. I might as well hang up my spikes."

"My arm is terrible," he said later, when he calmed down. "I don't know what to make of it. Maybe it will come around when we hit the cold weather. If it doesn't well, I don't know."

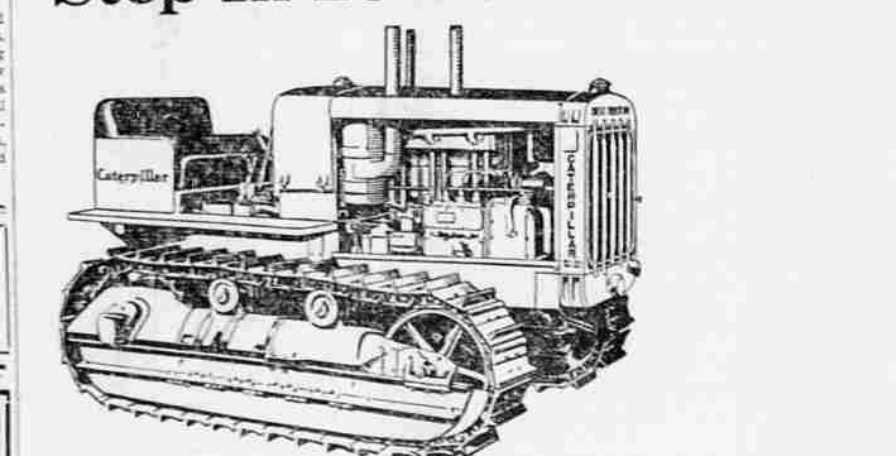
