"Fine," said Norman, heartily, as they formed a procession and marched to his den.

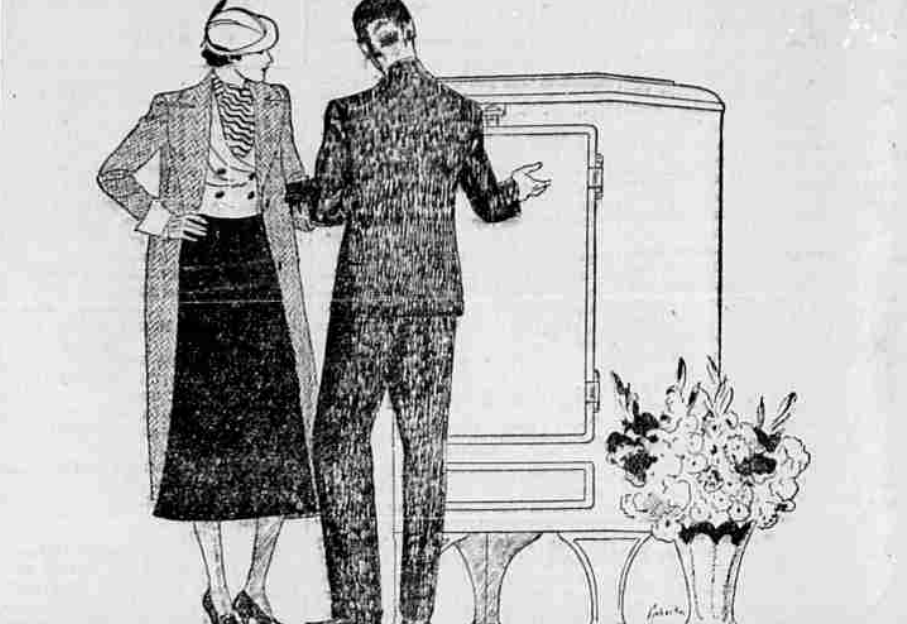
