Joe Di Maggio, youthful San Francisco Seals' outfielder who established a new Pacific Coast league record last year for hitting in consecutive games, was bidding today to beat his own record. He hit in every game of the opening series and topped off his performance in the Seals' first game against Seattle yesterday by rapping out two home runs and a single, driving in six runs.

The Seals won, 15 to 6, then took the second game, 5 to 2, to go into a first place tie with Los Angeles. Behind the excellent pitching of Jack Wilson, the Portland Beavers won the opener from Los Angeles, 6 to 3, but were blanked as the Angels walked off with the nightcap, 7 to 0, as J. Millard Campbell turned in the week's best performance on the mound, a three-hit game.

Oakland nosed out Hollywood to win series, 4 to 3, taking both ends of yesterday's double header, each by the same score, 5 to 1.

Sacramento found Gabby Street's San Francisco Missions for a double-header to take the series, 4 to 3. In the morning game at Stockton Tom Flynn pitched his teammates to a 6 to 5 victory. Paul Gregory made his first start of the season by hurling the Senators to a 5 to 3 win in the afternoon game at Sacramento.

Senators Picked To Win Pennant In Junior Loop

NEW YORK, April 9 (AP) — Given a substantial vote of confidence despite their failure against the Giants in the 1933 world series, the Washington Senators are picked to repeat in this year's American League race, starting next Monday in the national capital.

Tubulation of votes in the eighth annual Associated Press pennant poll, conducted among major league sports writers and editors, shows the champions to be the choice of 49 out of 97 experts. This is slightly better than 50 per cent for Joe Cronin and his well-balanced crew.

The rest of the clubs are picked to finish in this order: Boston Red Sox, third; Detroit Tigers, fourth; Cleveland Indians, fifth; Chicago White Sox, sixth; Philadelphia Athletics, seventh; and St. Louis Browns, eighth.
