WHEAT PAYMENTS REACH TOTAL OF \$61,771,453.00

WASHINGTON, D. C. (Special)—A total of 740,370 checks amounting to \$61,771,453 had been written up to March 15 wheat farmers cooperating in the acreage adjustment program of the agricultural adjustment administration, it was announced today.

The first payment of 20 cents a bushel on the farm allotment of farmers who signed contracts in the wheat campaign has been practically completed. These payments have been made to farmers in 37 states. Wheat section officials estimate that the final total of this first payment will approximate \$66,000,000. A second payment of 8 cents a bushel, less local county association administrative costs, is scheduled to be made after farmers have presented proof of compliance with their wheat adjustment contracts.

Approximately 550,000 contracts were signed in the campaign to reduce wheat acreage by 15 per cent. The large number of checks as compared with the number of contracts is accounted for by the fact that many contracts were signed by more than one person, as for instance, a landlord and a tenant.
