F. is sponsoring. Mrs. Kate Hanley, president, appointed Miss Lydia Hug to look up the history of the Summerville region. Thanks were extended to Mrs. Harriet MacDonald, Mrs. George Curry and Mr. and Mrs. Julius Roesch for the many courtesies they have extended the past year.

Mrs. Harriet MacDonald had charge of the program and presented a community sing lead by Miss Hug, with Mrs. Nell Thacker at the piano, using the old songs, "Year of Jubilo," "Old Kentucky Home," "Old Folks at Home," "Faith of Our Fathers." Mrs. Tom Walshinger gave a paper on "A Covered Wagon Trip in 1862." This was an account of the Woodell-Walshinger trek across the plains, recounting in detail many incidents not usually contained in the written histories.

Mrs. Alex Robertson and Miss Hug sang two duets "Springtime" and "Clementine." Mrs. MacDonald read a story by her brother, John Ellisworth, on "Young Chief Rolling Thunder" (Young Chief Joseph). CHICAGO, Apr. 11 (AP)—Little Dorcie Zielow, two years old, died today of cold and starvation a short time after a 13-year-old boy confessed holding her captive for two days in a crumbling attic.
