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CONCERNING DR. WIRT'S REMARKS

Dr. Wirt's sensational statements regarding a "brain trust plotted revolution" in this country with Roosevelt as the Stalin or some other if the president refused to go along with them, are undergoing investigation. It all seems so

ridiculous that the average citizen at first thought needed not even the customary grain of salt to take it as ravellings of a sort of fanatical and none too natural mind.

However, as the investigation of the doctor gets under way and one sees the considerable preparations made by the "brain trusters" themselves to conduct every defense and the unrestrained mirth and delight with which they greet every statement not particularly sustainable, one stops to think for a second time. There seems, in the present line-up of the Wirt investigation, too much of an effort upon the part of the "brain trusters" to get the eminent doctor's scalp and discredit and ridicule his remarks rather than to allow his testimony full reign and without fear of blemishment let public intelligence judge whether or not our president's advisors are anything else but honest and truly patriotic in their desires and programs.

The probe into the Wirt situation will probably result at the present time in little more than the usual rag chewing. The hunt for any possible dishonorable colleagues will be

lost in the hunt for material to dishonor and disqualify Dr. Wirt and that individual will probably go back to his home in Gary a sadder and wiser man.

Ridiculous as they may seem to most of us today, the essence of Dr. Wirt's remarks will not, in the writer's humble opinion, be entirely dissolved in the present hearing and we shall hear more of the subject anon. Our president, we are quite sure, has no idea of setting up in this country a communistic or fascist form of government. Regardless of some of the so called learned clique who have surrounded him, this country is going ahead into further readjustments and improvements in our economic welfare.
