UNION COUNTY REGISTRATION SHOWS GAIN

Books Will Close Tuesday Evening, April 17—Primary Election on May 18.

Republicans in Union county have decreased 49 and Democrats have increased 168 since the registration at the time of the special election last July. This according to the books of County Clerk C. K. McCormick, which shows a gain in registered voters in the county to date of 117.

"Independent" registration has lost two, otherwise the count in other parties remains the same.

Republican registration still shows a good lead in the total figures to date as follows: Republicans, 3884; Democrats, 3377; Socialists, 31; Prohibitionist, 19; Progressive, 6; Miscellaneous parties, 80. Total to date, 7397.

Registration closes Tuesday, April 17, next week. Under law there can be no registration between then and the primaries 30 days later in May. Persons who voted at the last general election in November, 1932, are eligible to vote at the May primaries unless they have changed address since that time. This under the recent permanent registration law. Persons who have changed address, even though still in the same city or county, must register the new address in order to vote next May.

Any youngster who will reach his or her majority between next Tuesday and election day, May 18, may vote at the primaries and registration will be taken upon notice to the county clerk before election day.

DILLINGER LEADS RAID? ARGENTINE OPPOSES PLAN OIL STRIKE THREATENS INSULL AT SMYRNA TODAY

WARSAW, Ind., Apr. 13 (AP) — A man identified as John Dillinger led a machine gun raid on the Warsaw police station today, slugged a policeman, stole four, bulletproof vests and two revolvers and got away.

ROME, Apr. 13 (AP) — Delegates from the huge wheat growing country of Argentina opposed today the minimum export price plan being debated by the international wheat commission. Before the conference is a program recommended by a subcommittee to boost the value of wheat through a minimum export price plan but its details have not been revealed.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 13 (AP) — Harvey C. Frening, president of the International Association of Oil Field, Gas Well and Refinery Workers of America, told reporters today a strike involving 100,000 members of the organization will be called "within 48 hours" if wage differentials prepared by the planning code authority are adopted.

SMYRNA, Turkey, Apr. 13 (AP) — Samuel Insull Sr., arrived today by train from Panderna, preparatory to embarking on the S. S. Eklona for the United States.

By the Associated Press. Speaker Rainey of the house today issued a statement he would be glad to see the silver groups in congress unite on a bill and promised he would make way for it in the house. "There is an overwhelming sentiment in the house, and I think also in the senate, for silver," he said.

In the meantime, much activity was noted in the law-making and executive branches of the government. President Roosevelt, back from vacation, signed a bill repealing the prohibition law in Alaska, another prohibiting financial transactions with foreign governments which have defaulted in their debt obligations to the United States, and 25 other measures, principally private relief bills, but including extending the time for commencing and completing a bridge across the Columbia river at Astoria, Ore.

In the house the list of signatures on a petition to force action on the McLeod bill to pay off depositors in closed banks reached the required 145 when signed by Rep. Strohich (D-N.Y.).

The senate approved a finance committee amendment to the revenue bill, on which a final vote may take place before night, to reduce from 5 to 1 cent per \$100 the stamp tax on sales of produce for future delivery. The senate interstate commerce committee approved the modified Dill-Rayburn bill for federal regulation of communications. The bill would among other things, permit the president to take over the communications system in time of war or on the threat of war.

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
