Explains Delay In Baker P.W.A. Project Progress

BAKER, Ore. (Special) — Mayor Bert L. Harvey has been notified by telegrams from Senators Charles L. McNary and Frederick Steiwer that consideration of Baker's application for P. W. A. loans for construction of a sewage disposal plant and the re-laying of water mains on Broadway is involved in the question of the security of the self-liquidating bonds the city was authorized by the voters to issue.

City officials were authorized by local residents at an election to issue bonds totaling more than \$100,000, or at least enough to cover the city's expense involved in the projects. The city applied for a loan of 70 per cent of the cost and a grant of 30 per cent.

'Black Wednesday' In Large Mid-West Area Due To Dust

LINCOLN, Neb., Apr. 12 (AP) — Dust made it a "black Wednesday" in a large midwestern area Wednesday. Driven by strong north winds,

clouds of dust enveloped parts of South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas, sometimes blotting out sight of the sun.
